
Garrison Home From Convention

Ex-Navy Men and Recruits Invited To Sign Up Soon

Ex-navy men over 31 years old are now eligible for reenlistment it was announced today by Chief Piech the local navy recruiter. Maximum age for entry into the regular navy remains at 31, however total number years of active navy duty may be deducted from a man's age for computing maximum age requirements.

Men desiring to re-up for another hitch may do so for a 2, 3 and 4 year obligation, and are eligible for 30 days advance leave immediately after re-enlistment.

Three year enlistments are now available to recruits enlisting in the regular Navy, it was announced by Chief Piech, the local Navy recruiter. Three year first enlistment Navy contracts have long been desired for men who particularly desire naval service but do not desire to enlist in four and six year program.

Personnel enlisting in the three year program will receive nine weeks of recruit training at San Diego, California and then be assigned duty in fleet or overseas billets. The Navy school programs available in four, six and minority enlistment contracts remain unchanged.

Los Angeles area Seventh-day Adventist gave \$218.60 per capita in tithes and offerings above local church operating and building expenses in 1961 a report from the denomination's Southern California headquarters reveals.

Alvin G. Munson, Glendale, secretary-treasurer of the Southern California Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, said the per capita giving represents a total of \$4,578,963. Given by some 21,000 members of 84 Adventist churches in Los Angeles, Santa Barbara and Ventura counties.

Giving statistics by members for local church building headquarters, Mr. Munson said, but they represent "a substantial increase in the overall giving picture."

"Gifts are not the measure of depth in Christian experience," Mr. Munson said, "but selfless giving which springs from love for God and fellow man is clearly indicated in this giving picture.

The church official said members of the Seventh-day Adventist church practice tithing (giving one tenth of all income) as recognition

those engaged in spiritual ministry. Members make contributions over and above the tithe toward other expenses of the Church.
