Carson Man Named to Committee

L. O. (Lew) Griffiths of Carson has been named by County Supervisor Burton W. Chace as one of five members of the Los Angeles County Road Financing Committee.

The committee was recently created by the Supervisors to study demands by the local division of the California League of Cities for a greater share of County gas tax funds.

Two of the six cents highway users tax levied by the state is subvented to counties and cities. Of this, one and three-eighths cents is allocated to counties and five-eighths of one cent to cities.

Many of the cities have adopted resolutions holding that the split is not equitable and that they require more money for maintenance and construction of local streets.

The county has maintained that the division is appropriate because the county spends much of its share building important traffic arteries between the cities to facilitate a better flow of traffic throughout the county as a whole and the cities are not equipped to construct and maintain inter-city highways.




