Business and Civic Leaders of Torrance to Head Red Cross Drive

Torrance business and civic leaders will head the city's 1962 Red Cross campaign, according to George Post, chairman of the branch board of directors.

"We have been very fortunate in the type of leadership we have recruited this year," said Post.

City chairman for the \$11,400 Torrance campaign will be Ken Miller, realtor. Miller is past president of the Torrance-Lomita Board of Realtors and also is a member of the Torrance Planning Commission.

The appeal is broken down into business, commerce and industry, and residential divisions.

Robert Lewellen, owner of Lewellen Press, will direct the business solicitation. Clarence Clark of Bank of America will direct C and I volunteers.

THREE CHAIRMEN

Three chairmen are responsible for the residential campaign. They are:

Goal for the Los Angeles Chapter Red Cross is \$3,320,629. Services provided by last year's fund were:

Collection and distribution of 163,757 pints of blood; 23,582 troubled families of servicemen; 100 in first aid, water safety, and home nursing to more than 69,000 individuals.
