## Youth Placed in Court Custody on Kidnap Charge

Dale J. Luxton, 18, 17040 Atkinson Ave., was placed under the jurisdiction of Los Angeles Juvenile Court Friday in connection with an assault on a 47-year-old Torrance housewife.

The Torrance youth is charged with suspicion of rape, robbery, and kidnaping.

According to investigators, the victim said she was forced off the road by another car, Feb. 20, in the vicinity of Del Amo Blvd. and Carmelyn Ave., Torrance.

She was then dragged from her car by the other driver, who threatened to kill her. He took her purse containing \$120 and drove her to Del Amo Blvd. and Victor St., where she was criminally assaulted.

Her attacker ordered her to run away from the vehicle and across the field, she related to Torrance police officers.

## Two Gunmen Loot Liquor Store in Lomita Holdup

Two bandits, working swiftly and efficiently, held up a Lomita liquor store Monday night, tore out the telephone, and made their escape with approximately \$100, it was reported yesterday.

Clerk Robert H. Burnham, 22, said the two entered the store, located at 26125 Western Ave. drew pistols and removed the money from the register. After taking his wallet they ordered him into a back room and fled.

Fortunately for the solution of this, several sets of fingerprints were conveniently left, which the police have on record. However, both the school and the police officials would appreciate hearing from anyone who may have any further information.

## Irate Property Owner Threatens Suit Against City

Ted Koletos, Torrance developer, last night told officials that he would bring suit against the city if he was not granted a building permit on Hawthorne Blvd. property immediately.

Disputed property, located south of the Old Lomita Blvd., on the east side of the street, is subject to inundation, city officials aver.

Koletos contends that there are already buildings on the land and that the site where he intends to build has never flooded. He told councilmen that he was promised the building permits seven months ago but that they have not been granted.

## City Named in Suit Over Plane Fire Last Month

Claims totaling \$16,660.50 were filed against the City of Torrance Friday as the result of an airplane fire Jan. 14 at the Torrance Airport.

John S. Trier, 841-11th St., Manhattan Beach, and Robert Fitzsimmons, Redondo Beach, are being represented by attorney Donald Hitchcock. Fitzsimmons was a passenger in the plane.

Trier, owner of the burned plane, appeared before city councilmen after the fire to complain that the field's firefighting arrangements were inadequate, but councilmen voted not to let him be heard.

Damages being asked for are: Personal injury, \$2,500; damage to plane, \$8,510.50; loss of income due to damage to plane, \$2,450; and medical expenses not to exceed \$500.

## Couple Are Victims Of 'Error' Reports Appellate Court

A Torrance couple, held in jail for the past 71 days on charges of willful child neglect, were ordered released on their own recognizance yesterday by the District Court of Appeals.

The appellate court agreed with contentions of defense attorneys that the pair were victims of a court error and had been denied their right to a speedy trial on the charges.

Claude Bishop, 40, and his wife, Marjorie, 39, had been held in county jail since their four year old son, Michael, was found dead Christmas Day.

Boy, who weighed only 16 pounds at the time of his

death, was found dead in his crib by his parents. Hospitalized once before for neglect, it was charged that the boy died of starvation.

**LATER REPORT**  
A later coroner's report showed that the boy died of hydro-encephalitis and murder charges were dropped and child neglect charges substituted.

Defense attorney Arthur Zamloch brought the case before the appellate court contending that the couple were the victims of an error by Municipal Judge Donald Armstrong. Preliminary hearings on the case were held in Judge Armstrong's

courtroom. Zamloch, who had been appointed by the court to defend the couple, said that they had been denied their right to a trial within 30 days of arrest.

Judge Armstrong, who was defended at the hearing by deputy district attorney Harry Sondheim, contended that he had "zealously" tried to protect the legal rights of the couple, that the defense counsel had been appointed on Jan. 22 and that it would have been an abuse of the constitution to hold the trial by the Jan. 24 deadline. Appellate court will take under advisement a request for a writ of habeas corpus.

## DISORDERLY SESSION . . .

## Unruly Crowd Attempts Intimidation Of City Officials At Mon. Hazard Hearing

Demands that a large, dangerous, open pit in a North Torrance neighborhood be fenced, filled and converted into a park were repeated at last night's council meeting, following an unruly session Monday night in which city officials were hissed and booed.

Jerome S. Satuloff, a sales engineer, 2007 W. 179th St., spokesman for the more than 300 residents of the neighborhood, demanded that the city fill the hole at its own expense, condemn the land and turn it into "anything but a trailer park" immediately.

Pointed comments that the owner of the property

might have some rights in the matter elicited no replies.

Last night's session followed a stormy meeting Monday evening at Arlington and 178th St., when an unruly crowd of homeowners shouted and booed down suggestions by councilmen and sincere offers of help in relieving the dangerous hazard.

**KATHY FISCUS LAWS**  
Councilmen have agreed to enforce "Kathy Fiscus" laws which make it illegal to leave attractive and hazardous nuisances unfenced or unattended. City will fence off part of the

area and will demand that the balance be fenced by the owners of the property.

One portion of the land is held as a lease by Henry Guinzer to be used as a dump. When the area is filled and the lease expires, Guinzer has promised the land to the city as a park site.

Balance of the land is owned by builder R. A. Watt, who holds a variance that permits him to fill the pit and then use the land as a site for a trailer park.

Another discussion session between city officials and representatives of the homeowners has been called for next Tuesday night.
