Community Leaders Head Committee

Torrance business leaders Fred Mill and William Shawger today were named co-chairmen of the Bruinsma for Congress Committee for the Torrance area by John Sonneborn, campaign committee chairman.

In a joint statement the two men lauded Bruinsma for his "understanding and knowledge of the problems of the harbor area."



"Such prices and terms for Grandview-built homes on this favored peninsula have created a momentum of interest which has forced us to revise our building schedule sharply upward," said William C. Kulow, director of sales.
