

Torrance High Students Vie for Scholarships

Four senior students at Torrance High School have been announced as semi-finalists in the California State Scholarship search.

The students, Richard Hollins, son of Raymond and Irene Hollins; Bruce Norman, son of Wayne and Margery Norman; Gary Olson, son of Erling and Ola Olson; Richard Woodward, son of Dean and Carol Woodward, were named as semi-finalists on the basis of their scores in the scholastic aptitude tests. The awards given annually to outstanding high school students guarantee an amount ranging from \$300 to \$900 in \$100 amounts but in no case in excess of tuition and fees.

The California State Scholarship program was established by State Legislature in 1955 to enable able students in need of financial assistance to attend college and to divert students from public institutions of higher education to independent colleges and universities.

The program began in 1956 with 650 award winners and 650 have been added each year until 1959-60, when the program reached its maximum authorization of 2560 scholarships, budgeted at \$1,152,000.

The average amount of scholarship award is approximately \$450. More than 50 per cent of the students also receive a supplemental scholarship from the institution they are attending.
