UJWF Asking Support in Its Campaign

Beginning April 1 the United Jewish Welfare Fund will ask the people of the Los Angeles area to give \$8 million to help it carry out its life-saving programs. This is two million dollars more than was raised last year.

There is much suffering in the world—too much. Agencies like the UJWF, which is one campaign supporting 169 causes, do what can be done to relieve that suffering.

Hospitals must be maintained and staffed; medicine must be dispensed; children must be cared for, educated, in many cases, fed, clothed. Families are relocated, housed, kept together until they can become self-sufficient again. Recreational and social activities are provided for boys and girls, teen-agers, and senior citizens.

This costs. And the cost is borne by those who are able to bear it. The money we give to the UJWF is used to support a clear-cut, well-defined, realistic approach to major problems that face us all. Its emphasis is placed on the rebuilding of lives.

Seventh-Day-Adventists Now Contributing to Navajo Needy

Torrance Seventh-day Adventists are contributing funds this weekend to foreign-like mission posts of the United States.

"Every need does not lie on some far-off sun-swept Pacific atoll or African jungle clearing," says Pastor Goffar in commenting on the special offering being taken Saturday morning, March 31 at 11 o'clock.

"This offering will go to four locations in Arizona and Utah to help Navajo Indians—our all-but-forgotten 'original Americans.'"

According to Pastor Goffar funds received Saturday will help operate and expand educational and medical mission facilities at Holbrook and Navajo Mountain, Arizona, and Mexican Hat and Rock Door Canyon in southern Utah.

BOARDING SCHOOL
At Holbrook, Adventists operate a large boarding school for Navajo youths from age six through 20 years. At Navajo Mountain and Mexican Hat clinics are operated, and at Rock Door Canyon in colorful Monument Valley a school, clinic and 23-bed hospital is operated.

Pastor Goffar said scores of thousands of very needy Navajos will receive welfare supplies, education and medical help through funds contributed by members and friends of the local church on Saturday.

"The Navajo is a very proud but needy person," Pastor Goffar noted. "On his vast reservation that stretches across much of Northern Arizona and Southern Utah live thousands of these wonderful people. Their colorful homes,
