The Torrance Junior Woman's Club under the guidance of Mrs. Jack Dean, president, and her board will soon complete their 17th year in the federation in the Marina District of the California Federation of Women's Clubs, Junior Membership.

Since the club is a philanthropic organization, their achievements in this field are of primary importance. The club has sponsored several philanthropies this year under the direction of Mrs. Edward Aiken, philanthropy director. A sewing machine was given to the Harbor General psychiatric ward and new curtains were furnished for this ward. Several activities have been provided for the children at Garden Valley School for Mentally Retarded Children.

A tour of the fire department, a party complete with clown and an afternoon at the miniature golf course were some of the activities provided for these children. The club has donated \$250 toward the purchase of a portable puppet stage complete with sound system to the Torrance Recreation Department.

There have been many other accomplishments in the philanthropic field, for example, polio clinics, staffing the Well Baby Clinic at the Health Department weekly, helping with the Muscular Dystrophy Drive by placing canisters with local merchants.

Recently the Torrance Juniors in co-operation with the Torrance Civitans took over the sponsorship of the Torrance Scout Center. This has been a club project for five years. Staffing the fire-works booth for funds for the building is a yearly project.

Torrance Juniors have sponsored two contests—The Americanism essay contest and the Teen-Age Miss Contest. A \$100 scholarship for art is given to a graduating senior. Business meetings have had interesting programs, on fire, cancer film, home decorating, book review. In April the students from American Field Service will give talks about their experiences in family life and schooling in a foreign country.

Torrance Juniors have many good times together. Beginning the summer, with a swim party then a picnic, the year gets off to a good start. A fashion show in November with the handicraft fair featured party and casual clothes. December gala event was the Christmas dance held in the Chrystal Ballroom at the Palms Restaurant. An evening at the theatre with husbands was enjoyed in January. A barn dance with square dancing will be the social event in March. Plans are in progress for the annual Spool and Bobbin Fashion Show which features fashions made by members for themselves and their children. Senior Women's Club are the guests at this event.




