

# Demand New Trial for Convicted Man



**SEEKS NEW TRIAL** — Sharon Smith, 18, wife of convicted kidnapper Billy Romain Smith, 21, told Torrance Press reporters that they will seek a new trial for her husband on April 16. The doughty, 18-year old wife of convicted kidnapper Billy Roman Smith, 21, yesterday pledged a continuing fight to prove that her husband was innocent of the charges.

Sharon Smith, 21927 Harvard St., scored the decision of the court and said that she had instructed her husband's attorney, Robert E. Krause of Long Beach, to seek a new trial on April 16.

In an exclusive interview Thursday with Torrance Press reporters, she took exception to the conduct of

the trial, pointing out that each time one of the alleged offenses was committed her husband had been in the presence of qualified witnesses who had testified at the trial.

When one of the court officials had chosen to call them "alibi witnesses" the jury had apparently ignored their testimony.

#### WITNESSES

On one of the occasions, at the exact minute the crime was committed, she said, the defendant had been with a crowd of 13 people celebrating the wedding an-

niversary of her parents. Each of the persons had testified to this effect at the court hearing.

Referring to the trial as "frontier justice" and "let's give him a quick trial and THEN hang him" procedure, Mrs. Smith said that, at one time during the trial, one of the prosecuting officers joked with the jury and "had them doubled up with laughter."

"Throwing away the future, and possibly the life, of an innocent man is certainly nothing to laugh about," she said.

Smith was sentenced to life imprisonment last week.

Attorney Krause affirmed that fact that he will appear in court on April 16 to seek a new trial.

#### NO CONCERN

Refusing to comment on the conduct of the trial, Krause stated,

"That man is certainly innocent of the charges. Original complaints filed by the victims all said that the suspect was 5'10" tall, weighed about 185 pounds, had dark eyes and long, bushy, black hair. Smith is about 5'5", weighs about 130 pounds has blue eyes, and

has worn a crew cut for years.

"Description concerning the gun used in the crimes and the clothing worn by the suspect didn't jibe, either," he said.

Smith, a cook, was arrested by a police stakeout in January. At that time police agencies in the county and city strip were under pressure because of a series of laundromat holdups, kidnappings and assaults. Attorneys for the defense did not discount the possibility that officers might have been "over anxious" to bring in a suspect.

# WOMAN THROWN OVER P.V. CLIFF AS CAR FLIPS

## Driver Booked On Stolen Car, Theft Charges

Two persons were hospitalized Friday night when their car flipped over at the top of a Palos Verdes cliff.

Upside down, the car teetered at the top, a door opened, and a woman passenger was thrown over the 200-foot cliff.

Palos Verdes firemen were called to the scene of the crash, 1200 block of Palos Verdes Drive West, and descended the cliff to rescue the victim. She was identified as Lorraine Garcia of Pico Rivera.

Taken to Little Company of Mary Hospital, her condition is listed as serious.

Police and firemen searched the area for 30 minutes before locating the driver of the car. He was finally found, wandering in a dazed condition, over a mile from the scene.

Refusing to give his name, he was taken to Harbor General Hospital for treatment and was finally booked on suspicion of grand theft auto. Car in which the pair had been riding had been reported stolen.

## A Question of Blame For Youths' Actions

A word of commendation and another of condemnation is certainly in order, following last week's spectacular fire at the Carl Steele School and the swift apprehension of the suspects alleged to have started it.

A hatful of kudos should go to Torrance police officers who worked ceaselessly until the suspects were in custody. A special commendation should go to Lt. Gus Rethwich of the juvenile bureau, who put in 36 exhausting hours on the case and didn't quit until the youngsters responsible were known and were in custody.

The condemnation is another matter.

#### RESPONSIBILITY

Someone must accept responsibility for the actions of the youngsters, especially when these youngsters have admitted destroying nearly \$100,000 worth of property belonging to the taxpayers of this city.

Someone must accept the responsibility for these two 15-year-olds being out, and unsupervised, in the pre-dawn hours when the fires were set.

Someone must accept the responsibility for the liquor which the youngsters admitted drinking before they broke into the school. Someone, whether a liquor store employee who wasn't too careful about checking ages, or someone in the immediate family who wasn't too careful about keeping the stuff locked up, must accept this responsibility.

Whoever is responsible we must remember that it is always the taxpayer who picks up the final bill.
