## School Board Will Survey Possibilities of Burglar Alarms for Torrance Schools

Members of the Torrance School Board Monday night agreed to investigate the financial feasibility of installing silent burglar alarms in district schools and suggested more adequate lighting be installed at two elementary facilities.

Recommending the installation of the alarms was S. E. Waldrip, assistant superintendent. Action followed last week's fire at the Carl Steele school which did

damage in excess of \$100,000 before it was brought under control. Fire was deliberately set by two 15-year-old youths arrested two days later. Boys admitted setting the fires and other damages to the school.

Area near the school has been plagued with an outbreak of petty burglaries, destruction to property and vandalism. Parents and property owners in the neighborhood have requested addi-

tional police protection for school and private property. Shrubs and young trees in a nearby park have been pulled up and trampled and a door was recently reported torn off a park washroom. Residents near the Carl Steele School reported to board members that prowlers are frequently seen on the school grounds and reminded them that nearby Flavian School was recently vandalized.
