Actress Rosemary DeCamp of Hollywood Riviera has been named Southern California chairman for the 1962 Be Kind to Animals Week, it has been announced by George Crosier, general manager of the Los Angeles SPCA and Southern California Humane Society, local sponsor.

"A little hand... a lot of help" is the theme for this year's Be Kind to Animals Week, which will be observed May 6-12. "The week will serve as a reminder," says Miss DeCamp, that we should practice kindness every week in the year.

Among the conditions which BKA Week seeks to eliminate is the desertion of animals, which is not only cruel but illegal, and the cause of community health and traffic problems. As Miss DeCamp points out, "such cruelty is unnecessary, since any unwanted pets will be accepted by any of the SPCA shelters." This is one of the society's activities in conjunction with its effort to eliminate cruelty to animals.

Another SPCA service is making animals available for adoption into good homes. Miss DeCamp is the author of a just-published book, "Here, Duke," which describes the fun her family has had with Duke, an Irish setter she adopted from an SPCA shelter.

### Air Force Offers Educational Program for Men

It's a fact that the more education a person receives the further he can expect to go in life and the more rewarding his future can be, said MSgt. James P. Lefevre, local air force recruiting representative.

With this in mind, the air force has instituted the airman education and commissioning program for airman on active duty.

Under this program, carefully selected, career motivated airmen are assigned to a civilian college or university for an undergraduate program. Applicants, both men and women, must have at least 30 accredited semester hours, or 45 quarter hours already accrued before being eligible for this program. Graduation is followed by assignment to officer training school and commissioning as a second lieutenant after successfully completing the three month OTS course.

Sergeant Lefevre said this program affords an opportunity for those who have completed only one or two years college to enlist in the air force and complete their education and be commissioned as well.

To apply, applicants must be United States citizens and at least 18 years old. The maximum age to be eligible to apply is that which will permit the applicant to complete all requirements for appointments as an officer before his 30th birthday.

### Boyce Is Outlining Finances

Volunteer workers in the campaign to elect Dr. Merle H. Boyce as the Republican candidate for Congress in the 17th District at the June primary elections, have set a campaign finance budget of more than \$10,000, it was announced yesterday by Blayne Asher, campaign finance chairman.

Nearly a score of finance committee workers representing Gardena, Torrance, Hawthorne, San Pedro, Wilmington, Lomita, and Harbor City sections of the district gathered at the Palms Restaurant in Torrance to outline plans for the campaign drive.

Funds raised will be used for newspaper advertising, billboards, bumper stickers, posters, mail and telephone work and for headquarters maintenance, according to Mr. Asher.

Randy Ransom, Torrance businessman, and Ralph Morris, with Rome Cafe, will be among the prominent republican leaders in the area taking an active part in the fund raising drive.

Boyce, a native of Wilmington and a leader in Young Republican and youth work in church and YMCA circles, is gaining a wide following throughout the area. Preliminary campaign contributions have given the drive to elect Dr. Boyce impetus, according to Asher.

### Sanitation Food Course In Torrance

A course in food sanitation stressing the importance of personal health habits, and proper storage of prepared food in preventing food poisoning will be offered to owners and managers and employees of commercial eating establishments in Torrance area, Dr. K. H. Sutherland, Los Angeles County Health Officer announced today.

Sponsored by the Los Angeles County Health Department, Bureau of Sanitation, the two session course will be held at Fern Avenue School Auditorium, 1314 Fern Ave., Torrance on Tuesday, April 24, and Thursday, April 26. Each session will be presented twice daily, from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m., then repeated at 7:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. To complete the course, it will be necessary to attend one session on each day.

Individual food handler certificates denoting satisfactory completion of the course will be given to persons who attend both class sessions. A wall certificate, suitable for display, will be given to each establishment whose management and employees complete the course.

### Spartans Vie for National Merit Scholarship

After months of apprehension, two Spartans have been named finalists in competition for a National Merit Scholarship. In order to attain this status, these students first took the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test and then they faced the Scholastic Aptitude Test, another rigorous, three hour examination. The students whose scores on the second test substantiates their performance on the qualifying test, and who were endorsed by their high schools became finalists in the competition.

Founded in 1955, the National Merit Scholarship Corporation offers an opportunity for students to obtain financial assistance if they need it.

In past years, more than 97 percent of the semi-finalists have become finalists. All finalists received a Certificate of Merit in recognition of their outstanding performance in the program.

As finalists, Miss Carolyn Mohr and Miss Irene Hanson will be eligible for scholarship awards sponsored by about 130 business corporations, foundations, associations, individuals, and the National Merit Scholarship Corporation itself. In the final phase of competition, the high school grades, extra curricular activities, school citizenship, and leadership qualities of the students will be evaluated along with the scores on their tests.

The winners will designate the college they wish to attend and the course of study they plan to pursue.

The names of the Merit Scholars will be announced about April 26.

### ELECTRIC SKILLET

More readers write about the sad appearance of the electric skillet. The discoloration of the exterior of an electric skillet is largely due to the "burning on" of grease vapors or drippings which have not been completely removed when the skillet was washed. So often the skillet is washed last and the grease is in the dish water. Since the exterior of the skillet appears to be clean, it is not scoured. Any grease in the dish water collects on the bottom and when the skillet is used, the grease burns on. Each time the skillet is washed without being scoured the grease burns onto the outer portion and becomes increasingly difficult to remove. To avoid the discoloration scour the outside of the skillet each time it is used.
