Owen Moss Assigned to Summer Program at State University

Owen Moss of Torrance, formerly of Seattle, Washington, is among 32 students selected to participate in New Mexico State University's National Science Foundation undergraduate research program.

Moss has been assigned to work on the summer program of 1962 under the guidance of Dr. S. Goldberg, assistant professor of mathematics at NMSU. He is currently being trained in basic mathematical functions dealing with research projects.

Students selected for National Science Foundation undergraduate research must be majoring in a field related to their research projects.

Purpose of the program is to train students in actual basic research. This opens the way for graduate study, which in turn will produce trained people able to do basic research in the future.

Sponsored by both the National Science Foundation and the university's research center, the students receive stipends of \$600 for a 10-week summer session and \$150 for the academic year program.

Moss is a freshman in physics at NMSU, where he has served on the publicity committee for Religion in Life Week and is faith chairman of Westminster Fellowship. He is also a member of Southwestern Mountaineers at NMSU.

He graduated from Highline High in Seattle. There he was president of Drama Shop and a member of the Chess Club.
