Eight performances are scheduled in the Starboard Theater on the Wilmington campus, April 27 to 29 and May 1 to 5.

The play, which won the Critic's Award in its Broadway production, is set in France at the turn of the century. It centers around an aging general recalling his past loves. The part of the general is played by Eugene Dynarski, star of many previous Harbor productions.

The part of the general's domineering wife is played by Jacqueline Smalley. Other cast members are James Schuler, Dianne Farnum, Kathie Hooker, Heather McKeag, Joe Rojas, Delray Gallwas, Charles Bean and Cherry Young. Reuben Plaskoff, drama instructor, is directing the play with the assistance of Lizz Glogovsan and Brian Hagen.

Commenting on the play, Plaskoff said, "We try to bring to the students and public, plays which are not in the commercial vein. We like to select plays that will entertain and educate as well as provide an emotional experience for the viewers and actors. 




