### Warning Given by President of Torrance-Lomita Realty Board

Ownership and transfer of real estate will suffer a serious blow if the recent recommendations of the Secretary of the Treasury to the Senate Finance Committee to curb capital gains on real estate sales is enacted by the Congress, Jack Schmidt, president of the Torrance-Lomita Board of Realtors, warned today.

The Treasury Department's recommendation would substitute the present high ordinary income tax rates for the lower capital gains rate on the sale of real estate which has been subject to tax depreciation allowances and held for six years. After that the ordinary income rates would apply to less of the gain, but a property owner would have to hold property 14 years and 4 months before all of the gain would be taxed at capital gains rates. This affects all real estate which is used in a trade or business or is otherwise income-producing such as apartment houses or single-family dwellings held for rent.

#### DEPRECIATION

In addition, the Treasury wants to end all depreciation deduction methods except the straight-line method.

Mr. Schmidt pointed out that the National Association of Real Estate Boards testified against the Treasury proposals recently before the Senate Finance Committee.

He explained that the Treasury recommendations would have an adverse effect upon investments in new industrial, commercial, and residential construction because the higher tax on the gain would prove a substantial deterrent to the sale of real estate and reinvestment of the sales proceeds in new construction.

#### PURPOSE

Mr. Schmidt added that these changes run counter to the central purpose of the tax bill which passed the House on March 29, 1962. "On the one hand," he said, "the administration wants to provide a tax credit to stimulate construction of

plant equipment, machinery, air conditioning, washing machines, bowling alleys, furnaces, electric ranges, and just about everything but buildings. Not only are buildings excluded from the investment credit provisions, but the Treasury wants Congress to penalize investors in real estate.

"Members of the local real estate board are uniting with realtors all across the country in opposing this proposal," He said, citing this as an example of how realtors—members of NAREB—keep abreast of national, state, and local legislative measures affecting their community, and take action in the community's interest.
