Authority on Semantics to Appear at ECC

Dr. S. I. Hayakawa, internationally-known leader in the field of semantics, will speak on "Our language and our world" at El Camino College Tuesday, May 15, at 8:15 p.m. in the Campus Theater.

"Semantics, if we wish to make it so, is the study of how NOT to be a . . . fool," says Dr. Hayakawa in forthright terms.

The educator continues, "My interest in semantics grew out of attempting to teach English meaningfully from the beginning of my teaching career in the middle 1930's."

Since 1956, Dr. Hayakawa has taught as a professor of language arts at San Francisco State College. With the aid of 12 assistants, he teaches 270 students in the study of semantics.

Through extensive interest and study, he became president of the International Society of Semantics. Founder of "ETC" magazine, he has served as editor of the semantics magazine since 1943. Because language is involved in the health and pathology of both individuals and civilizations, there is no end to the study of semantics," the professor states happily.

The professor's wide interest in anthropology, psychology, and sociology is evident in his long list of memberships in professional organizations. One of three books he wrote, "Language in Thought and Action," was translated into four languages.

Dr. Hayakawa proves a pet theory of his in action, "one can be a specialist in several fields." He is an authority on American jazz, modern art and the sport of striped fishing.
