Top College Gymnasts Will Meet Fri. at Santa Monica

Putting the capper on its 1962 gymnastic season, the best team in El Camino College history treks to Santa Monica City College Friday night at 7:30 for the Metropolitan Conference finals.

Eight Warriors have filled 16 places in the meet. To qualify, a gymnast must have finished third in an event in at least two Metro dual meets.

Although the Tribe beat only one team during the conference dual meet campaign, Coach Don Jurk is optimistic about Friday night.

Jurk believes this year's team is the best one he has ever had.

"We qualified twice as many men for the finals as we ever have before," Jurk explained.

Jim Blacic and Earl Terao have qualified in the rope climb for the Warriors. Blacic stands a good chance of placing high in the meet, according to Jurk, with a time under four seconds for the event this year.

Dennis Oliver will be eligible for All-Round honors in the meet by qualifying in free exercise, the parallel bars, long horse and rings.

Don Dewey will also be eligible in the All-Round category after qualifying on the high bar, side horse, parallel bars and rings.

Minnie Inouye will go on the rings and long horse for El Camino, while the Warriors will be represented in tumbling by Pete Russell.

Doug Campbell and Dave Werner will both compete on the side horse for ECC, and Werner will also try for top honors on the rings.

The top five finishers in each event will continue in the Southern California meet.

In their final Metro meet of the season, the Warriors dropped a 104½-53½ decision to third-place Harbor.

With the loss, El Camino settled into sixth place in the loop. Valley finished first, with Long Beach, Harbor, East Los Angeles and Santa Monica trailing. Bakersfield finished in the cellar.

Only one first place fell to ECC against the Seahawks, as Inouye grabbed a first in the rings with Werner third and Oliver fifth.

On the rope, Blacic climbed 4.4 seconds for second as Terao tied for third. Russell and Oliver deadlocked for fourth in free exercise.

On the horizontal bar, Dewey took a second, with Inouye finishing fifth. Campbell wound up third on the sidehorse, with Dewey and Werner taking fourth and fifth.

Oliver tied for second on the parallel bars while Dewey managed a fifth. Oliver, Inouye and Blacic finished third, fourth and fifth on the long horse.

Russell and Oliver took third and fourth in tumbling. While Inouye grabbed a fourth on the trompoline.

In the All-Round division, Oliver earned a fourth and Dewey a fifth.

ECC To Host Swim Champs

State Swimming Finals Start Tomorrow; Top Teams Vie for Title

Top junior college swimming teams from the Siskiyou to Baja, California will be represented tomorrow, Friday and Saturday as El Camino College hosts State Swimming Finals.

Three Metropolitan Conference teams, Long Beach, Santa Monica and Valley will be favored along with northern power, Foothill College, from Los Altos, to walk off with the state title.

Long Beach, winner of seven state championships laid strong claim to crown with a convincing victory in the Southern California Championships over the weekend at Santa Ana.

Finishing second behind Valley in Metro dual meet campaign and third in the conference meet behind the Monarchs and Santa Monica, the Vikings were counted out of the Southern Cal title picture.

"TOUGH"

"The Vikes have a reputation for being tough in the 'money' meets, and lived up to their reputation in running up 93 points to second place Santa Monica's 76½. Valley finished a disappointing third with Orange Coast finally breaking through the Metro domination with a fourth.

El Camino, behind its triple-threat trio of Cappy Sheeley, Bob Allred and Tom Vren, chalked up 20 points in finishing seventh.

Three national records were erased from the books as Valley's Jim McGrath grabbed the spotlight by setting new standards in both the 50 and 100-yard freestyle events.

McGrath knocked two-tenths of a second off the old record in the 50-free, clocking a 22.3 and clipped one-tenth second from the 100 mark with a 50.0 time.

Terry Humphries, Long Beach breaststroker, turned in a 1:04.2 in his pet event to shave three-tenths second off the previous mark.

"IMPRESSIVE"

Sheeley was the most impressive of the Warrior finners, placing in three events. A fourth in the 200-yard individual medley fell to Sheeley as he stopped the watches in 2:14.3 and a 2:14.4 clocking in the 200-yard butterfly also netting from a fourth.

Sheeley's other place came

El Camino Spikers Trek to Metro Conference Sat.

Competing in the Metropolitan Conference Track and Field Championship finals at Bakersfield this Saturday, El Camino College spikers approach a cherished steppingstone to the State Championship.

Eight junior colleges will be striving to set new marks in the annual Metro challenge and to take the coveted first-place team trophy home.

Valley College has the edge over Long Beach in power, but both remain top choices for the Metro crown. Bakersfield seems a possible third, but will be pushed hotly by El Camino, East Los Angeles and San Diego, who, in turn, could be threatened by Santa Monica and Harbor.

Individuals from each of these teams will make competition grueling, shattering records where they might fall.

Among the string of choice athletes who will vie for individual championships are El Camino distance men, Mike Thornton, with times of 1:54.4 in the 880 yard run and 4:15.5 in the mile, and Richard Fernandez, a 9:31.6 two-miler. Warrior sprint ace Dennis Jett holds El Camino school records in the 100-yard dash with a 9.8 clocking, the 220-yard dash in 21.7 and the 220-yard hurdles at 23.7 seconds.

ECC broad jumper Floyd Schmidt has leaped 23'10½", while Warrior pole vaulter Dave Vogl has cleared 13'6" often. The thorn in El Camino's side is its lack of depth in field events, sprints and short distances.

The Tribe countered in the fifth with three runs.
