Jones, who with his buddy from Phoenix, Tiger Gene Brown, looked marvelous last week as he roared the huge 500 cubic inch Roosevelt Dairy Chevy Special, last year's No. 1 car in the west, to a thrilling victory. Also looking good was Gardena's 1961 champion, Jack Brunner, now driving the fast No. 3 Chevy for the first time.

### ECC's Mike Thornton Wins Mile Race in Metro Finals

Their conference chores over for the season, Metropolitan Conference track stars head for the West Coast Relays at Fresno this Saturday after Valley College won the loop crown during the spectacular Metro meet last week at Bakersfield.

To do it, the favored Monarchs had to stem a tremendous closing surge by Bakersfield, which was spearheaded by Jim Fanucchi, who set a junior college pole vault record by clearing 14-10.

Valley's final total was 82. Other scores: Bakersfield, 74 2-3; Long Beach, 74; El Camino, 72 1-3; San Diego, 68; East L.A., 43 1-3; Santa Monica, 19½; and Harbor, 1-6.

Depth won it for the Monarchs, who stacked up 17 points in the two-mile to keep out of reach. Dick Krenzer won it with a 9:33.6 ahead of a 9:37.1 by Rich Fernandez of El Camino. Valley's Joe Jacobson took a third and teammate Elmer Harlan was sixth.

Krenzer was also second in the mile race with a sparkling 4:14.6. El Camino's Mike Thornton won the event in a flashy 4:11.6.

The meet was spiced by two resounding upsets. In the high jump, Sy Ornstein, a rank outsider from Valley, won with a leap of 6-6¼, while Long Beach's Dennis Wynn defeated his teammate Bill Pace in the shot put with a toss of 54-9¼.

Pace had a 53-8¼.

Only double winners in the meet were sprinter Tim Russell of Long Beach with times of 9.8 and 21.3, and San Diego hurdler Leonard Kary with 15.2 and 23.9.

Other first place winners for Valley were Dennis Pierce in the 440 (48.7) and discusman Lou Fasano with a 152-3. East Los Angeles' Bill Sheue spearheaded the 880 field in 1:55.1 and El Camino's Floyd Schmidt won the broad jump with a 22-10¾. El Camino also won the relay in 3:19.5.

Fanucchi sailed over the bar on his second attempt to shatter the old record of 14-8¾, and led his vaulting mates on a 16½-point spree in the event that nearly won it for the Renegades.

### Senator Scores Athlete Junkets For Servicemen

Professional athletes called into military service have a job to do in recreation programs but should not be relieved of duty to join junketing service teams.

Senator Clair Engle (D-Calif.) expressed this opinion this week in an interview filmed for television release.

The Senator specifically criticized the scheduling of an Army baseball team from Fort Lewis, Wash., that played college teams in Northern California last week. Tony Kubek, New York Yankee infielder, and several other professionals are members of the squad.

He said he is not opposed to professional athletes being drafted or taking part in the service recreation programs, but said he does take issue with the policy of "drafting these fellows and then setting up what amounts to professional ball clubs and relieving the players of all other duties as soldiers."

The California Senator urged that the professional athletes be used as instructors in sporting events and fitness programs at the military bases where they are stationed.

Senator Engle added that he favors inter-service rivalry—base vs. base athletic competition with professionals being allowed to take part—but is against Army teams that "do nothing else but travel the country and play baseball."

"And they're not always playing for the entertainment of the troops. They're playing college teams and everybody else," Senator Engle said.

### Harbor College Gymnasts Place 2nd in Metro Meet

Three Harbor College teams wound up competition over the weekend leaving only the baseball team still active. The track, tennis and gymnastic squads went through their Metropolitan Conference Finals with the gymnastic making the best showing.

The Seahawk musclemen placed second to L.A. Valley in the league finals at Santa Monica. Final official figures were not available from the meet officials but Valley scored an unofficial 160 points to Harbor's 126.

Top Harbor scorers were John Christensen and Gerry Gibson.

It was a sad week in baseball. With a chance to catch up with the leaders two Harbor pitchers, Sayre Smith and McFadden pitched complete games allowing only four runs. Unfortunately the Harborites, themselves, could get only one run. End result was that Bakersfield won 2-0 on Friday and San Diego won 2-1 on Saturday. El Camino, which has become the spoiler of the second half defeated both league-leaders, Bakersfield and Long Beach on successive days. At present Bakersfield and Long Beach are still tied for the lead with 8-4 records.

### Wednesday Night Horse Show, Race At Ascot Park

Something new and different, a weekly Wednesday Night Horse Show and Races, is the latest attraction at popular Ascot Park, the half-mile auto racing plant located at 183rd and Vermont in Gardena, just off the Harbor Freeway.

Starting at 8 p.m. each Wednesday evening, a host of the Southland's top horse owners stage an eight-race open competition, in which girl riders may compete with men on equal terms.

Races are held in the various categories: three quarter-mile events, four half-mile races and a one-mile marathon for all breeds.

Featured in the action will be the likes of Jim Williamson, who won four events opening night two weeks ago, including sensational wins in the quarter and half-mile events atop Lucky's Clabber.

Another top favorite in the Indian pony class, "Apoloosa," is Ted Ford, riding "Warriors Chief."

The aforementioned Williamson, incidentally, established an opening night record of 22 seconds flat for the quarter-mile around one turn.

Ascot officials announce that admission to the Wednesday Night Horse Show and Races is free of charge, and invite horse lovers to come out and watch the action. The event will run through the summer months, it was stated. Gates will open at 8:30 p.m. with the first event scheduled for 8 p.m. each Wednesday night.

### Bakersfield Contender for BB Title

Defending champ San Diego grabbed two victories last week while Long Beach and Bakersfield took turns losing to spoiler El Camino to keep the derby wide open.


