RC Bloodmobile Visits Torrance

The Red Cross bloodmobile is scheduled for a visit to Torrance Thursday, May 31, according to Mrs. Robert Orsini, chairman of blood recruitment for Torrance-Lomita Red Cross branch.

Collection facilities to accommodate 275 donors will be set up at the Elks Lodge, 1820 Abalone St., Torrance, from 2:30 to 7 p. m.

Mrs. Orsini's telephone line, FA 8-0647, will be open from 10 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. to take appointments for the bloodmobile.

"This will be our community's chance to give its support to the Red Cross blood program, which provides such a vital service to not only our local residents but to those needing blood all over the country," states Mrs. Orsini.

She points out that eight bottles of blood are used every minute of every day to treat the ill and injured in our country.

NEED DONORS

Emphasizing the need for donors to build the Red Cross blood stockpile, Mrs. Orsini says that last year the Red Cross provided 165,000 pints of blood for use of persons in the Los Angeles area.

"This was 77 per cent of all the blood used in hospitals throughout Los Angeles County and while more was called for, this was the extent of Red Cross capacity," she explains.

Local hospitals and the number of pints of blood supplied to them by the Red Cross during the past year include: Harbor General, 1563; Torrance Memorial, 651; Little Company of Mary, 547; and Riviera, 408. "Those who give blood at the forthcoming mobile will be providing for the needs of themselves and their families.

"Unfortunately, we cannot foresee the time when our loved ones will be stricken by illness or accident; therefore, we must be prepared for any emergency," says Mrs. Orsini.

Anxious to fill the 275-pint quota at the bloodmobile, the recruitment chairman says she will be happy to personally explain the Red Cross blood program to individuals or groups wishing to establish accounts with the ARC program.
