Torrance Police Department Sends Trainee North


An officer from Torrance Police Department will be among sixty-five police and sheriff's officers from throughout the state who will receive California Highway Patrol training in emergency vehicle operations, Commissioner Bradford M. Crittenden announced.

The men have been divided into nine classes, each of 2½ days' duration. The first started this week, and the program will run through June 8 at the Patrol's Sacramento Academy.

Four hours of classroom work and 16 hours of driving are included in the comprehensive course taught by Sgt. Robert Phillips, who conducts similar classes for Patrol cadets. Sgt. Phillips will be assisted by Officers Edward Gamble and B. Dolan Lannan.

Driving instruction will include defensive driving techniques, practice in operating on surfaces with reduced traction, and pursuit driving. The Patrol's skid pan and 2.3-mile high-speed course will be the site of instruction.

When the program was first proposed by the Patrol, response was so great that it was decided to enroll one man from each police or sheriff's department, rather than a larger number of officers from any one agency, in order to accommodate as many departments as possible.

City School System Expects Huge Enrollment for Summer Sessions

More than 130,000 students will attend a six-week summer session in 179 schools operated by the Los Angeles City School system, it was announced this week by Superintendent of schools Jack P. Crowther. The six-week session—to be conducted at all levels from elementary schools through junior college—will begin on Monday, July 9 and will continue through Friday, August 17, Crowther said. Sessions will be held primarily for students wishing to catch up in certain subjects or for those who need special instruction.

Representative schools will be operated in all sections of the system's 850 square mile area in order to give as many students as possible an equal opportunity to attend.

Approximately 24,000 students are expected to enroll

in 105 elementary schools. Classes will likewise be held for 73,000 students in 17 junior and 28 senior high schools.

ADULT SCHOOLS

Also scheduled for operation are 14 adult education high schools—with an enrollment approximately 20,000 students and even junior colleges which will also enroll approximately 20,000 students.

Classes will also be offered in seven schools for physically handicapped students—six elementary and one secondary.

Emphasis in the summer sessions will be placed on improving academic skills, as well as providing opportunities for students to overcome grade deficiencies, Crowther stated.

However, the complete scope of the summer school program will be governed by the 1962-63 school budget now under consideration, as by enrollment demands following next month's completion of the current school year.

Superintendent Crowther urged all persons interested in attending summer sessions at either the adult school or junior college level to contact the school of their choice for exact registration time.

STL Building New Cafeteria

Construction will begin in July on a new building to house the Employee's Cafeteria for Space Technology Laboratories, Inc., a subsidiary of Thompson Ramo Wooldridge. Building will be the sixth structure for STL's Space Technology Center at One Space Park, Redondo Beach, California.

Robert A. Burgin, Director of Administrative Operations at STL, revealed plans for the cafeteria based on the mid-April decision by the company's Board of Directors which granted approval for design and construction of the facility.

According to Burgin, the new structure will feature the latest in cafeteria equipment in an area covering over 20,000 square feet. A dining room which can be easily converted into a conference room will adjoin the regular self-service cafeteria.

Completion date is set for the Spring of 1963.

Architects for the project are Albert C. Martin and Associates, with the firm of Fred Schmid and Associates, Food Facilities Planning Engineers, contracted to design the internal cafeteria areas. General contractors for the building are Twalts-Wittenberg.

Five buildings have now been completed at STL's 110-acre site in Redondo Beach. Of these, three are two-story research buildings, one a five-story engineering office building, and one the specially-designed space, craft fabrication, integration and test building.

First buildings at the site were occupied last November. Special dedication ceremonies for the Space Technology Center are scheduled for late in June.
