The Pasadena Foundation for Medical Research has received a \$1500 gift from the Las Vecinas Women's Club for the purchase of scientific equipment that will be used in the foundation's program of cancer research.

Mrs. John V. Woods, president of the women's club, presented the check to F. Edward Little, president of the foundation, at a meeting of the board of directors.

New equipment, a micro-tome-cryostat, will be used in metabolism studies of potential new anti-cancer compounds according to Dr. George S. Sharp, medical director.

Sharp said that Las Vecinas had "generously expanded" the connotation of its name, "The Neighbors," when it became interested in the cancer research program of the Pasadena group through reports of one of its members, Mrs. Lee Flanagan of Redondo Beach, who is also a member of the Associates of the Pasadena Foundation for Medical Research.
