Torrance Area Projects Win County's Approval

Preparation of plans and specifications for construction of sanitary sewers in Torrance and surrounding area were authorized by the Board of Supervisors Tuesday.

On motion of Supervisor Burton W. Chace, the board approved a petition signed by persons representing 83 per cent of property in the area to be served.

Construction of sanitary sewers and the appurtenant work along 216th St. and other rights-of-way will proceed upon final approval of plans and specifications and award of contracts.

The work is being done as a public health and welfare project under provisions of Division 7, Streets and Highway Code, Chace said.

In a second action it was reported that allocation of \$17,500 from the 1962-63 Road Department budget for improvement of two major streets in Torrance area was approved.

Project, which will be scheduled after July 1, 1962, provides for improvement of the north side of Carson St. from Normandie Ave. to 125 feet west of Budlong Ave., and on the south side from Vermont Ave. westerly for 600 feet.

Supervisor Chace cited recent traffic studies indicating that Carson St. carries an increasingly heavy flow of traffic in the area adjacent to the new Harbor General Hospital.

Benefits accruing from the completed project will include improved area drainage, decreased roadway maintenance costs and in-

creased roadway efficiency, Chace added.

Existing pavement in the project area will be widened to join with curb and gutter installations constructed by adjacent property owners under county permit.
