Adventist Minister Will Attend Huge Campmeeting

Glenn L. Goffar, minister of Torrance Seventh-day Adventist Church, 1610 Acacia Ave., will trade his Bible for a hammer June 19 to help prepare for one of the Southland's largest religious convocations.

On Tuesday, June 19 at 8 a.m. Pastor Goffar will join more than 200 ministers and other church workers from Los Angeles, Santa Barbara and Ventura counties at 4100 Imperial Highway, Lynwood, to help ready facilities for the 59th Annual Campmeeting of Southern California Seventh-day Adventists.

The session will be held from June 22 through June 30, and will draw thousands of Southland members of the Adventist church to daily and weekend meetings.

Many members of the Torrance Adventist Church will attend the nine-day session. Saturday worship services of the local church will be transferred to the convocation on June 23 and June 30.

Pastor Goffar will help clean large auditoriums and other meeting facilities of the convocation along with his fellow ministers from 84 Southland churches. He will also be assigned to place thousands of chairs, build platforms, arrange tables, unpack thousands of song books as assigned by the minister preparation superintendent of the session.

"It is a privilege to help prepare for this convocation," Pastor Goffar said in commenting on his special assignment which will end on June 21 as the preparation work is completed. "The spiritual blessing that comes to those who attend this meeting is worth more than the few sore muscles which may be gotten as the convocation site is readied."

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Girl Admitted To Orthopaedic Hospital in LA

Karin Martin, 13, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Martin of 2636 W. 178th St., Torrance, has been admitted as a patient at Los Angeles Orthopaedic Hospital.

Torrance is one of the many Southland communities which send its handicapped children to Orthopaedic Hospital to become straight and strong.

While the hospital serves private patients, no disabled boy or girl up through the age of 21 who can benefit from orthopaedic care is refused admittance at the hospital, regardless of race, creed, place of residence or ability to pay. Since 1920, more than 80,000 crippled children have been cared for at Orthopaedic Hospital.

Although operational funds are provided the hospital through community chests and united funds, its capital funds for expansion and new building must be raised through public appeal, officials pointed out.

Residents of communities where children receive help were urged to support the institution's current fund drive for a new \$7,500,000 children's center, where care of the Southland's growing numbers of crippled children can be continued.

Contributions to the fund drive may be sent to Orthopaedic Hospital, Los Angeles 7.

Final Services For Veteran ECC Instructor

Final tribute was paid Dr. Lyle Tussing, an original member of the El Camino College faculty, in services conducted yesterday morning in McMillan Funeral Chapel in Gardena.

The author and college instructor died Tuesday night in a Redwood City Hospital. On sick leave from the college since November 6, Dr. Tussing was hospitalized in the northern city on May 16. He suffered a coronary attack on May 25 and a subsequent attack on Saturday evening.

Born in Clinton, Iowa, 51 years ago, Dr. Tussing completed college work at Iowa State College, Dakota Wesleyan University, and Purdue University, where he completed requirements for both the master and doctor of philosophy degrees in psychology.

Prior to his arrival on the El Camino College campus, the educator taught at Beloit College in Wisconsin, Purdue University, Wilson City College in Chicago and in Burbank City Schools. He served El Camino in both teaching and administrative capacities during his 15-year tenure at the college.

Dr. Tussing was the author of two books and numerous published articles. Most recent of his books was published during the current school year. Titled "Study and Succeed," the book serves as an orientational guide to college students wishing to increase efficiency in work and study. A previous publication was used as a psychology text.

During World War II, Dr. Tussing served the government and industry in the areas of leadership training and as an industrial research director.

Active in youth, church, civic, fraternal and service organizations, Dr. Tussing included among his affiliations membership in the El Segundo Masons No. 507, Elks Lodge No. 1378 of Redondo Beach, Sigma Xi fraternity, the American Psychological Association, Phi Delta Kappa, the California Teachers Association, the Vocational Guidance Association, and the National Education Association.

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Highway Patrol Studies Fatal Accidents to Discover Causes

The role of carbon monoxide, alcohol and drugs as causative factors in single-vehicle fatal accidents will be probed in a research program undertaken jointly by the California Highway Patrol and the California State Coroners Associations.

Patrol Commissioner Bradford M. Crittenden said that initially the study will be conducted in 20 counties, including Los Angeles County. The patrol will gather and analyze data on the accidents themselves, including special information relating to the possible presence of carbon monoxide in the vehicles involved.

Cooperating coroners will conduct post-mortem examinations on fatal victims from the same accidents to determine the presence of carbon monoxide, alcohol or drugs.

"Single vehicle accidents were chosen for the study because this type crash has increased sharply in recent years. In addition, it is relatively simpler to isolate relevant facts when only one car is involved," the commissioner said.

"Carbon monoxide has long been suspect in those accidents in which the driver apparently went to sleep. With the coroners' assistance in this study, we should be able to discover much in this area.

"We also will have the opportunity to more accurately pinpoint the presence of alcohol and drugs and their contribution to the traffic accident toll."

The commissioner said that a number of cities within the 20 participating counties also have agreed to take part in the program.
