

Six El Camino Students Receive Scholarships

Six El Camino College students are recipients of scholarships from three universities and the state of California. Merl F. Sloan, college director of student personnel, announced at the June awards banquet.

Winners of scholarship grants from the University of California are Rudolph Johnson, Torrance, and Jim Masuda, Gardena.

Mason Wolpert, also of Torrance, holds a \$1000 per year award to the University of Miami, Fla. Wayne Overbeck, Manhattan Beach, is the recipient of a journalism scholarship to the University of Southern California.

Winners of California State scholarships are Johnson, Overbeck, Norman Michelson, Gardena, and Rosalind Zehra, Hawthorne.

State Scholarships are applicable toward tuition and fees at any accredited four-year college or university in California, and provide a maximum of \$900 per year, renewable for four years.

Winners of the state awards are chosen on a basis of scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test, past academic record, and financial need.

Johnson, a pre-med major at ECC, will transfer to the Berkeley campus of the University of California in September. A 1960 graduate of Hawthorne High School, Johnson was valedictorian of his class.

In addition to the two scholarship grants, Johnson received a special scholastic award at ECC in the field of physical sciences.

Wolpert is a '60 graduate

of North High School, Torrance, where he was student body president. He was active in forensics activities at ECC, winning a series of awards.

Masuda, a political science major at El Camino, plans to transfer to UCLA in the fall. He has been active, along with Wolpert, in the campus forensics program.

Overbeck will transfer to USC in the fall, majoring in journalism. He was a graduate of Mira Costa High School in 1960.

Active in student government and journalism at El Camino, Overbeck held the post of commissioner of publications for three semesters, and has received several awards in journalism.

Assault Ship Open to Public

The USS Princeton (LPH-5), recently returned from the Western Pacific, will be open to the public at Long Beach on Saturday and Sunday, June 23 and 24.

This will be the general public's first opportunity to view an Amphibious Assault Ship. This new weapon in the navy amphibious arsenal is a direct result of the adoption of the revolutionary technique of vertical envelopment. "Vertical envelopment" is the term applied to the system of landing a Marine assault force using helicopters as the vehicle for ship to shore movement.

The Princeton will be berthed at Pier "E", foot of the Long Beach Freeway.

Instructor Takes Part In Program

John Moehlman, El Camino engineering instructor, will participate in the 1962 Summer Industry Education Program of Hughes Aircraft Company.

Mohlman will be assigned to the Guidance and Navigation Department, Guidance and Controls Division, of the Hughes Aerospace Group. In addition to his work the instructor will participate in the lectures, seminars and tours which are part of the SIEP program.

Moehlman took his undergraduate work at the University of Michigan, and completed the United States Naval Academy postgraduate course in naval architecture during World War II. After graduation he served a tour of duty in the Pacific as Engineering specialist (hull duty) with the Bureau of Ships of the US Navy.

After the war, Moehlman completed requirements for his masters degree at Harvard University and has since completed 30 graduate units at UCLA. His work at El Camino College during the past two years has been concentrated on the preparation for and installation of the new materials science laboratory. His fall semester program will include teaching one day and one evening section of this course, Engineering 24.

Park Commission Set to Operate San Pedro Park

The Los Angeles City Recreation and Park Commission this week requested the city attorney to prepare the final draft of a proposed agreement between the city and the State Division of Beaches and Parks for the operation of Royal Palms Beach State Park, San Pedro.

The draft submitted to the commission by the State Division of Beaches and Parks is the result of long-time negotiations between the Recreation and Park Department and the state agency.

Under terms of the proposed 25-year agreement, prior approval of the state will be required for all concessions; and prior approval will be required for any development, beach erosion control, or protection work undertaken by the city, state or federal government along and around the beach.

Royal Palms Beach State Park is located in the 15th District, which is represented by Councilman John S. Gibson Jr., and the lease would become effective July 1.
