3 Bandits Kidnap Man, Rob Market

Three armed bandits wearing stocking masks kidnaped a grocery manager at his home in Torrance late Monday night, drove to the supermarket where he worked in San Pedro, forced him to open a safe and escaped with an estimated \$20,000.

The manager, Lawrence Schropp of 2330 234th St., told Torrance and Los Angeles sheriff's department detectives that he was apprehended by the bandits about 11 p.m. Monday when he was driving his car into his garage after coming home from work.

He said two of the bandits forced him back into his car at gunpoint and drove to the supermarket while a third man followed them in another car.

He said both bandits pointed guns at him all the way to the store and one threatened "I'll kill you if you make a false move."

Schropp stated that he was forced to open the safe. He told detectives the bandits were in the store for only about 10 minutes.

No trace of the armed robbers was reported.

City Officials Reject Proposal to Buy Stock of Moneta Firm

City of Torrance is going ahead with its condemnation suit to acquire the Moneta Water Company although the suggestion was made the council might buy the stock of the company instead.

City Attorney S. E. Remelmeyer reported last night to the council he had filed condemnation proceedings yesterday in Superior Court. He stated he had talked with attorneys representing Moneta and Dominguez Water Co. The latter had been reported as ready to buy the majority of stock of the Moneta company.

Remelmeyer said Dominguez intimated it may not go ahead with its plan to purchase stock in view of the city's condemnation filing. He added that the attorney for Moneta suggested the stock purchase as a possibility.

Mayor Albert Isen and other councilmen were opposed to the proposed stock deal. Isen said the "City of Torrance is vitally interested in expanding its water system and we want a solid title to the operation."

In other action: The Council approved a tract by Don Wilson builders for erecting garden type apartments on the south side of 190th St., west of Entrado.

Mayor Isen favored the idea of a first class motion picture theater for the area as included in a request for approval of Rolling Hills Plaza leases by Jefferson Incorporated. The request was referred to the council airport committee and Airport Commission.

The council heard a report that Torrance topped all cities in the United States for lack of traffic accidents during he year.

Lights Go Out But Shoppers Not Disturbed

All electricity in the block of buildings at Del Amo Center where Magic Chef and Thrifty Drugs are located was shut off at 7:30 last evening.

Thrifty closed down but Magic Chef decided to stay open. Employees broke open carton after carton of candles and handed them out to customers to help them pick out their items.

Young male employees showed a decided tendency to aid young female shoppers and, when the candles inadvertently went out, an unusual amount of giggling seemed to come from the dark aisles.

Store manager said that he didn't think that power being shut off for four hours hurt business appreciably.

Some shoppers mounted two candles on the front of shopping carts like headlights. Kids with parents seemed to be having a ball.

Erect \$2 Million Carson Center in Torrance Area

Construction has begun here on a \$2,000,000 Carson Shopping Center at Carson St., and Normandie Ave., which will serve residents of Torrance and surrounding communities.

Developers of the seven-acre project are Arthur N. and Norman A. Reicher. Completion of the major portion of the project by Ernest W. Hahn, Inc., general contractor, is scheduled for September 15.

Included in the 100,000 sq. ft. shopping complex for which Leach-Cleveland Associates are project architects is a Boys' Market; Thrifty Drug; W. T. Grant's department store; Pacific State Bank branch; Union Oil Service Station, and auxiliary stores.

All buildings are of precast concrete and steel construction with the exception of the market and the bank, both of which will be brick structures.

Overall design of Carson Center is contemporary with broad use of glass and stone in all buildings. Liberal landscaping will accent the concrete and brick facades.

Parking at the center, which is located on block west of the new Harbor General Hospital, will accommodate 440 cars. The center is rectangular and faces Carson St., with the exception of the Bank, which is on Normandie Ave.

General contractor for the boys' Market is Stanley Construction Company. Other architects involved on the project include Robert H. Peterson, A.I.A., who designed the market, and George T. Nowak, architect and associates, designer of the Pacific State Bank branch.

All-Numeral Phone Prefix Ready July 8

Another all-numeral prefix will be ready for assignment to South Bay area telephones July 8, according to R. S. Pyle, Pacific Telephone manager.

He said equipment for the "830" prefix has been installed in the company's office at 1418 N. Broad Ave., Wilmington, and is being tested to ensure smooth operation.

Business and residential subscribers with "830" numbers will have access to direct Distance Dialing, which enables a person to dial long distance calls without going through an operator.
