

Wilderness Workshop' Features Conservation Science Program

A unique session, the Wilderness Workshop, is part of the Conservation and Natural Science program at the University of Southern California's campus at the Idyllwild Arts Foundation. During this session, June 24 to 29, a week is spent camping in the wilderness area of the San Jacinto Mountains above Idyllwild, exploring and studying primitive areas, and participating in conservation projects. Directors of this workshop are Jane Westen Berger, consultant with the Riverside County Schools and Ernest Maxwell, naturalist of Idyllwild.

Other shops in this program include the Conservation Education Workshop from July 15 to 27 under the direction of Jane Westenberger. This course deals with a study of the wise use of natural resources and includes field trips to study fire lookouts, sawmills, soil demonstration areas, wildlife management areas, watershed production and forest management, and ways in which this information may be included in the elementary school curriculum.

Field Natural History, from July 29 to August 10 under the direction of Dr. William R. Hanson of Los Angeles State College is a study of plants and animals of the Southern California mountains and their ecological relationships.

The program in Conservation and Natural Science is designed for teachers, group leaders, and laymen interested in the problems of the use of natural resources, conservation education, and doors. The mile-high campus better use of the out-of-and the area within a 50-

New Hunting Licenses Required After July 1

New hunting licenses for the 1962 hunting seasons will be required starting July 1, and are now available from license agents. The new licenses will be good through June 30, 1963.

Hunters will probably be startled when they buy their new licenses this year because of a radically new method of issuing licenses. The agent will hand them the new "self issuing" license application to fill out.

Instead of having the license agent fill out the form, the hunter will do it himself. Then, when the agent puts the appropriate stamp on the application, it becomes the hunting license.

The new self issuing method was devised to save time for the agent and hunter when the license is issued, and to save expense in the printing of licenses.

The resident license fee is still the same \$4, and the resident junior fee is \$1. The junior license is issued only to residents under 16 years of age on presentation of a

license from a prior year or of a certificate of completion of a state-approved hunter safety training course. A non-resident hunting license is \$25.

Resident deer tags, \$2, and bear tags, \$1, are also available now from license agents. Pheasant tags, \$2, will be ready for sale in October.

Hunters are asked to print carefully when they fill out their new licenses to make certain they are readable, and to save time and trouble in the field when licenses are checked.


