Torrance Firms Gain \$70,721

Torrance firms were paid \$70,721 for supplies purchased in 1961 by Western Electric, the Bell System's manufacturing and supply unit.

According to figures released this week by Pacific Telephone, the eight local businesses received an average of about \$8840 from Western last year.


State-wide, Western spent \$140,985,000 during the year for supplies and services, gross payrolls and major construction, the figures revealed.

Three thousand twenty-seven suppliers in 213 California communities received \$112,111,000 for raw materials, telephone company supplies and government sub-contracts, sold to Western, according to Dick Pyle, Pacific's manager.

California was fourth in amount of money received among the 50 states, District of Columbia and foreign countries with which Western dealt, the manager said.
