The seven-day exercise, involving 10 ships and 8000 men of the First Fleet, centered around a fast carrier striking force opposed by submarines and aircraft. Air opposition was provided by jet and propeller-driven aircraft, including medium bombers, using all types of weapons.

Ships participating in the exercise were an aircraft carrier, a guided missile frigate, a cruiser, three destroyers, two replenishment ships, two submarines and several units operating from aircraft carriers and land bases.

The exercise was commanded by Vice Admiral R. T. S. Keith, commander, First Fleet.

Airman Moody was trained to assemble, repair and modify special weapons, related components and test equipment.

Adventists Slated to Attend 49th World Conference

Plans are being formulated today at the Torrance Seventh-day Adventist Church, 1610 Acacia Ave., for participation by members and Pastor Glenn L. Goffar in the 49th quadrennial World Conference of Seventh-day Adventists in San Francisco beginning July 24.

Pastor Goffar, announcing the event to his church this week, said the world conference will draw 20,000 Adventists, including more than 1,000 official delegates from 100 different countries, to elect top world officials and to decide on all major policies of the Seventh-day Adventist church.

Leaving Torrance on July 23, Pastor Goffar will attend a world ministerial convention in San Francisco which precedes the world conference which opens on July 26 and closes on Aug. 4.

Pastor Goffar will be joining more than 200 ministers and other church workers from Los Angeles, Santa Barbara and Ventura counties at the ministerial convention which will feature addresses and forums by outstanding Adventist ministers and evangelists from around the world.

Pastor Goffar, a member of the Southern California Conference Ministers' Chorus, a 45-voice male choral group composed of ministers of Adventist churches in Los Angeles, Santa Barbara and Ventura counties, will participate with this group during the world session's keynote meeting in San Francisco's Civic Auditorium, July 26, at 7:30 p.m.

"Our local church members are looking forward to this great convention in San Francisco because, in addition to its many business aspects, it will bring added spiritual direction to their lives through the many outstanding addresses to be presented there by world church leaders," Pastor Goffar said.

Dr. and Mrs. C. F. Clark from the Congo will bring mission experiences to the Torrance church this week. Friday at 7:30 p.m., they will show colored motion pictures from South Africa. Saturday at the 11 a.m. service they will share their rich experiences in Capetown during the past 27 years with the congregation. The public may attend.
