

Missionaries To Establish Congo Home

A practicing physician and his wife, a registered nurse, will be sent to the Congo as missionaries. They are Dr. and Mrs. Paul E. Carlson, 21402 Budlong Ave.

The couple will represent the Evangelical Covenant Church of America. Making the trip with them sometime in the fall will be their children, Wayne, 7, and Lynette, 4.

Mrs. Carlson said she only would practice nursing in an emergency but that she would carry the title of a missionary.

She disclosed she and her husband became interested in the Congo after Dr. Carlson went there to practice for a five month period last year.

"My husband became very fond of the Congolese during his stay," Mrs. Carlson said. "He became very enthusiastic when the natives asked him to return."

Following his return from the Congo, Carlson began to practice as a Redondo Beach and Rolling Hills surgeon. His previous visit in Africa was under the direction of the Congo Protestant Relief Agency.

Before the Carlsons go to Africa, there will be a stop-off at Liverpool, England. There Carlson will take a course in tropical medicine.

He and his family will be stationed in the Ubangi area of the Equator Province. His present term is for three years. However Mrs. Carlson said her husband might consider a permanent appointment if the need is present.

Carlson went to the Congo last year to replace Belgian doctors who had evacuated the area when the African country received its independence. He had been a physician in residence at Harbor General Hospital prior to his Congolese visit.

City's Costs Jump to \$6240

The cost of city government jumped \$520 a month or \$6240 annually.

This amount will be used at the request of the City Council to pay a stipend of \$10 a month to each city commissioner or board member. There are 52 commissions and boards in the city.

The money will be listed as an expense account rather than a salary. The council took action to establish the \$100 a month fee upon the motion of Councilman Ken Miller.

The council approved the \$10 after the Civil Service Board had recommended a \$15 fee.

He prepared for his promotion at the Inglewood, Lawndale, and Lincoln Heights branches, where he rose to assistant operations officer status a year ago.

Born in Michigan, he moved to the Southland as a youngster and attended high school in Long Beach. His education was supplemented at Los Angeles Harbor Junior College.

Living in the South Bay area gives Ferguson ample opportunity to practice his favorite hobby, fishing. He and his wife, Mary Ann, are the parents of three children, Sheri, 8; Gregory, 6; and Michelle, 2.

Civil Defense Report to Be Ready Soon

A Civil Defense progress report will be compiled by the city administration staff at the request of Civil Defense and Disaster Commission and the City Council. The survey should be ready by the end of July.

Administrative Assistant Orin Johnson, who serves as assistant civil defense administrator under the direction of City Manager Wade Peebles, said the completed report will be presented to both the commission and the council.

The report will contain present progress and show how Torrance is related to Area G, Johnson said.

The Civil Defense and Disaster Commission already is on record favoring more shelters.

Johnson said he is a strong advocate of citizens committees. He pointed out he favors breaking the areas down for the citizens groups so that it includes the 27 fire zone districts.

"There is no reason why the citizens committees cannot function more efficiently once they are broken down and contained within certain areas," Johnson said.

Street Projects In PV Completed

New street developments in the Palos Verdes area have been completed and were accepted this week for maintenance by the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors.

Supervisor Burton W. Chace, in whose district the improvements are located, said the streets were constructed within a new subdivision by a private developer.

Supervisor Lists Improvements

Supervisor Burton W. Chace today released a list of major streets in the Wilmington-Dominguez area which will be improved from 1962-63 County Road Department funds.

Among the major projects to be undertaken this fiscal year within this area of the Fourth Supervisorial District are:

- Carson St. — Normandie Ave. to Alameda St., \$517,123;
- Central Ave. — Compton Blvd. to Alondra Blvd., \$99,000;
- Del Amo Blvd — Prospect Ave. to Western Ave., \$60,000;
- Figuerosa St. at Dominguez Channel, \$181,000;
- Greenleaf Dr. — Oleander St. to Alameda St., \$132,500;
- Sepulveda Blvd. — Normandie Ave. to Vermont Ave., \$112,175;
- Victoria St. — Figuerosa St. to Avalon Blvd., \$127,600; and
- 223rd St. — Normandie Ave. to Main St., \$160,000.

'Big Four' Race

Motorcycle racing's top four ranking figures in the United States were contestants in the eight-mile national championships at Ascot Park Saturday night, according to racing director J. C. Agajanian.

They are the leader, Dick Mann of El Sobrante, who has compiled 28 championship points in five national titles this year; Bart Market of Flint, Mich., with 22; Ralph White of San Diego with 17; and Carroll Resweber of Milwaukee with 16.

Resweber was bidding for an unprecedented fifth straight national riding title. A wrist injury prevented him from entering two of this year's five races, but has not kept him from out of range of the top spot.

Agajanian attracted the greatest list of eastern riders in the history of Ascot to run against the local stars in the 20-lap race. The last three eight-mile champions were southern riders—Neil Keen of Pasadena (1961), Al Gunter of Alhambra (1960), and Sammy Tanner of Bellflower (1959).

Plan Awards for People Who Give Help to Retarded

The Garden Valley Association for Mentally Retarded Children is searching for Torrance individuals who may be eligible for awards, according to Stanley Le Bon, president of the association.

He said in making the search, the Garden Valley Association is participating in a nation-wide canvass.

Nominations will close Aug. 1 for the international awards and grants in the field, which was recently established by the Joseph P. Kennedy Jr. Foundation.

To recognize achievements of the recent past, and to assist outstanding current projects, the program will disburse as much as \$225,000 each year.

Awards and grants will be made in three general areas: scientific awards to investigators in the behavioral and biological science awards, service awards to groups or individuals contributing to the care, rehabilitation or education and leadership awards.

Selection of award recipients will be made university scholars at Harvard Medical School, John Hopkins, the University of London, Stanford and Zurich.

A total of \$805,000 will be expended for major road improvements in the Palos Verdes area under Los Angeles County road fund allocations during the fiscal year, Supervisor Burton W. Chace said today.

The projects will be made available from County funds under the nearly \$40-million Road Department budget for 1962-63.

- Hawthorne Blvd. — 1.2-mile South of Crest Rd. to 0.2-mile East of Palos Verdes Drive West, \$303,000; and
- Highbirdge Road — Hawthorne Blvd. to Crest Rd., \$92,000.

Education Division Appoints Eight New Faculty Members

Eight new faculty members have been appointed to the staff of the Education Division of Los Angeles State College for the academic year 1962-63, it was announced today by Acting President Albert D. Graves.

The additions bring to 105 the total number of full-time faculty members in the Education Division, largest instructional area of the college, which awards bachelor's or master's degrees and issues credentials to approximately 1,000 members of the public school teaching force each year.

Named to the Education Division faculty are three in the field of elementary education, four in secondary education and one in special education. All have been given the rank of Assistant Professor of Education.

Added in elementary education are Dr. Doris C. Ching, doctoral graduate of Harvard University and former Assistant Professor of Western Washington State College; Roland Dick, a master's degree graduate and former assistant professor at Fresno State College, and June D. Oxstein, holder of an M.A. degree from Claremont Graduate School and former supervisor of the Rivera School District.

The four additions in secondary education are as follows: Clifford M. Hunt, master's graduate of the University of Southern California, part-time lecturer at Los Angeles State and field supervisor of the NDEA Guidance Institute at USC; Jeanne McLeod, a USC graduate and former consultant and demonstration teacher in the Riverside County Schools; Dr. Carleton B. Shay, holder of an Ed.D. degree from UCLA and a counselor and director of testing for Santa Monica High School, and Marianne J. Wolman, an M.A. graduate and part-time instructor at Claremont Graduate School and instructor at Pacific Oaks College in Pasadena.

AF Recruiter Seeks Men for Key Spots

Although today's aerospace force is becoming more and more technical, there is a continuing need for well qualified young men to fill key positions in the Air Force.

According to Staff Sergeant Cecil C. Mayberry, Torrance Air Force Recruiter, the Air Force is seeking 600 applicants in July, from the Southern California area.

Selection criteria for enlistment is currently open to non-high school graduates as well as high school graduates. The applicant is administered the Air Force qualifying examination, a percentile score of 40 or higher in the General, Administrative, or Mechanic Clusters or a score of 60 in the Electronic cluster is acceptable.

Upon successful completion of the examination, the applicant is administered the Armed Forces qualification test at the Armed Forces examining station. A final score of 31 is acceptable.

To qualify for enlistment, an applicant must be between 17 and 34, a U.S. citizen or a registered alien, be of high moral character, and must meet the prescribed mental and physical standards.
