Orange County Deer Hunt Applications Due Aug. 6. Time is of the essence for anyone who wants to participate in this year's special Orange County antlerless deer hunt, the Department of Fish and Game reminded sportsmen today.

The hunt, which was approved by California's Fish and Game Commission at its meeting June 29, is the earliest of the special antlerless hunts scheduled for this year. It will take place August 18 through Sept. 20. A total of 500 permits will be issued.

Applications for these permits must be received in the DFG's license office, 1325-A "K" Street in Sacramento, no later than 5 p.m. on Aug. 6. Application forms are attached to the 1962 deer tags, now available from any hunting license agent.

Track Fued May Be Ended

Senator Clair Engle (D-Calif.) said the White House will help solve the jurisdictional feud between the AAU and the NCAA over who will pick teams for international track meets if both disputants request Federal intervention.

Senator Engle fears the rift, which has split amateur athletic organizations in this country, will seriously weaken United States' chances for victory in the 1964 Olympics.

Senator Engle asked the White House to help mediate the conflict when the International Amateur Athletic Federation (IAAF), the world governing body of track, threatened to disqualify track athletes from international competition, including the Olympics, if they participate in non-AAU meets in the U.S.

The California legislator received a reply saying that White House advisors are very concerned about the dispute and its effect on this country's entry in the Olympics, but intervention at this time would have to be sought by both parties.

The warning from the IAAF, issued from London, would bar all collegiate performers from competing in meets sponsored by the new National Track and Field Federation.

The NCAA (National Collegiate Athletic Association) endorses he Federation and the meets it schedules. The AAU (Amateur Athletic Union) has refused to endorse the Federation — although Federation officials say they have invited the AAU to join.

The NCAA retaliated against the IAAF threat by limiting college track performers — the bulk of U.S. Olympic hopes — to meets approved by the new national Federation.

Knothole League Cubs Take First

This season's champion team in the Knothole League is the Cubs, managed by Jim Eno and coached by Tony Denhart. During the season, which ended July 4, the Cubs maintained an 18-win, 3-loss record.

'Golden Thing' Drag Boat Races in 4th Regatta

The world's fastest drag boat — Golden Thing — has entered the Fourth Annual Regatta of Champions at Long Beach Marine Stadium Sunday and will make a special assault on the 150 m.p.h. water speed barrier, it was announced today by J. C. Agajanian.

Driven by Chuck Garreth of Anaheim, the Golden Thing already holds the world record of 149.31 m.p.h. for the quarter-mile burst and is being readied for a crack at the special \$500 prize offered to the boat which breaks the fabled "150" mark.

A field of the country's fastest drag boats will be pitted in eliminations over the quarter-mile distance, a special highlight of a week-end program which also will include unlimited SK boat races, water ski races and drag ski competition.

The Golden Thing, co-owned by Jack Williams of Taft and Bill (Doc) McGann of West Covina, is powered by a supercharged fuel-injection Chrysler engine capable of a 1,000 horsepower.

Agajanian and the Los Angeles Boat and Ski Club, co-sponsors of the regatta, have attracted a strong list of challengers for the Golden Thing.
