


# Air Museum May Come to Torrance

## YES Agency Requests 'Yeses' for Youths

Torrance Youth Employment Service office, under the Torrance High Schools, the State Employment Service and the Junior Women's Club, report that during the first two months of operation, 600 young people between the ages of 14 and 21 have registered for work.

Lyle Albro, work experience coordinator for the Torrance schools, said this office is serving students who need after school and summer work as well as students who want a part time school and work program.

"This type of program has been helping the financially pressed students to stay in school, as well as the student who wishes to go into a trade, and feels a concentrated academic program does not fit into his future plans," he said.

Mrs. Baglio, youth coordinator, State Employment Of-

ice, pointed out that letters are coming in from various colleges from students asking to be referred to a summer job. These young people will be returning to school in the fall but need the earnings from summer employment to continue their education. "Job orders have been coming in to the YES office, but many more are needed if we are to help the majority of these young people," she said.

"Many businesses have an 'end of the day rush,' these young people can be trained to assist regular employees to handle this efficiently. Many employers will also be faced with vacation shortages of personnel. A part-time employee can fill in, in any emergency. Boys can be called upon to help when shipments of merchandise arrive," she added.

Mrs. Dorothy Bechdoit,

who staffs the YES office, stated that her applicants can fill many jobs which need doing, but have not been filled because employers are not aware of the needs and desires of many of the young people to be employed.

## Aero Crackdown On Low Aircraft

Sheriff Peter Pitchess recently served notice to southland pilots that his Aero Detail has begun a crackdown on low-flying aircraft. Other flight regulations will also be rigidly enforced.

"Los Angeles County has the highest density of air traffic of any county in the nation," Pitchess stated. "Unsafe practices in the air endanger the lives and property of scores of innocent persons. Flying an airplane, like driving an automobile, is a privilege, not a right," the Sheriff stated.

Pitchess pointed to five separate incidents in the past three weeks which resulted in fines and jail sentences of up to \$550, or 50 days in County Jail.

The Sheriff's Aero Detail, in addition to its other assignments, is charged with patrol responsibilities in the country's air lanes.

## Museum Exhibits Tiros Satellite

Actual photographs taken by TIROS, weather-observing satellite, are currently on exhibit at the California Museum of Science and Industry in Exposition Park. Successfully launched last year at Cape Canaveral, the TIROS is expected to become part of a world-wide system for weather forecasting.

Two TV cameras photograph cloud-cover and transmit information to the U.S. Weather Bureau for experimental uses. Twenty-one other nations are also taking part in the weather research program.


The photographs on exhibition at the Museum, through Aug. 10, show weather observation and reporting by TIROS.

## Crash Attack Against Polio Begins Soon

Project SOS—Sabine Oral Sunday—a crash attack on polio to eradicate the crippling disease forever in Torrance and other Southland communities, was announced recently by the Los Angeles County Medical Association.

Project SOS stands for Sabine Oral Sunday, a three-phase immunization program aimed at administering Sabine Oral Vaccine to the nearly 10,000,000 residents of Southern California.

It is estimated that nearly 30,000,000 dosages of the Sabine Oral Vaccine will be administered during the drive. At each phase a different type of vaccine will be used, for it was pointed out, three strains of polio virus exist in the human system.


First phase of Project SOS is scheduled for Oct. 21 and 28, to be followed by second and third phase clinics on Dec. 2-9 and Jan. 20-27.

Hundreds of neighborhood clinics within walking distance of every home will be set up in the six Southland counties on Sabine Oral Sundays, each headed by a physician-chairman.

All Salk clinics will be closed at the end of September. Meanwhile, all school children are advised by doctors to continue with their Salk shots so as to conform with the state law which requires they be immunized before entering school.

The vaccine is given by mouth, by means of drops on a cube of sugar. It is not necessary to use a hypodermic needle.

## Chairman Brands Victory Claims 'Nonsense'

Los Angeles County Republican Central Committee Chairman J. A. (Jud) Leatham recently branded as "traditional election eve nonsense" the claims of victory announced Sunday by the chairman of a 20-member committee working to unseat him at the GOP reorganizational meeting tomorrow night.

Earl Adams, head of the committee to elect Jack Drown of Rolling Hills to the chairmanship, stated that on the basis of a telephone survey Drown could expect 125 of the County Committee's 249 votes. In humorous reference to Adams' announcement Leatham made this rebuttal:

"Considering that I have 147 pledged votes for Tuesday and Drown's supporters contend they have 125 votes, it seems we now have twenty-three new members on the committee and I want to be the first to welcome them.

"I believe that Adams made a serious mistake in not calling me and a num-

ber of my friends before releasing his figures. With all the charges that have been made since Jack Drown declared his candidacy, I am even afraid to vote for myself except by secret ballot.

"I do not concede that Jack Drown has more votes than I have. I won't even concede that he is drawing
