

Callbox System Okayed

(Continued from Page One) Commission granted use of a radio frequency solely for the emergency call system.

The devices will transmit messages from the freeway location to Los Angeles Police headquarters, where a patrolman evaluates the emergency, unlocks an inter-panel and summons any of the specialized services required.

The transmitter call boxes will be mounted on light poles, and a notice on the box advises motorist to press the button once, wait 30 seconds, then press again.

CODED SIGNAL
Signals will be picked up by a receiver on Mt. Lee in Hollywood. From there a coded signal will automatically be sent via existing police microwave to police headquarters.

Elements of the system to be located in the police building include a computer, which "reads" and interprets the signal, and a tape readout and digital clock for record purposes.

Total transmission time is two seconds.

Ceremonies opening the Torrance portion will be held at 10:30 a.m. followed at noon by a luncheon at the Jump 'N Jack Restaurant. Members of the Inter-city Highway Committee will serve as hosts.

Participants in the dedication event include mayors of 11 area cities, chamber of commerce presidents and managers from the same cities, County Supervisors Burton Chace and Kenneth Hahn, officials from the State Highway Department, Congressman Alphonzo E. Bell Jr. (R-16th Dist.) and Cecil R. King (D-17th Dist.), and Assemblymen Charles E. Chapel (R-46th Dist.), Clayton Dills (D-67th Dist.) and Vincent Thomas (D-68th Dist.).

Only last-minute construction details remain to be completed on the new freeway link, including installation of signs and lighting. The Torrance section was built in two portions, the first from 190th Street to 174th Street and the second from 174th Street to 164th Street. Total cost was \$11,592,500.

Repaving Project Gets County OK

CARSON—A portion of Delores Street will be repaved under a \$19,000 allocation approved last week by county supervisors.

Supervisor Burton W. Chace said the work will be a joint venture between the County Road Department and the Los Angeles Board of Education.

The improvement, Chace said, will facilitate drainage, reduce road maintenance costs and provide safer access to a nearby school.

The work is slated between 223rd and 227th Streets.

Parents of Torrance teenagers got some straightforward advice this week from a panel of psychologists at Marymount College in Palos Verdes Estates.

Here's what they said: Teen-age delinquents are made, not born — and the blame lies squarely on today's parents who are too busy with their own activities to maintain authority in the home.

"Parents bribe, humor and bargain with their youngsters instead of exerting their positions as the heads of households. It has become just too much trouble to demand discipline and maintain it," they said.

Out of almost a hundred parental practices which lead to the confusion of youth, the college panel selected the following dozen as the most significant in shaping the future of the juvenile delinquent.

QUARRELS 'OKAY'

"Take his part in school and neighborhood quarrels. Let him realize that teach-

ers are underpaid competitors who couldn't hold a job elsewhere, and that neighbors are narrow-minded and envious.

"Let him dress and behave like a beatnik, especially when he tells you all his friends do, and he doesn't want to be different. "Don't insist on religious training when he's young, because he'll be much more interested in religion later on when he makes his own choice.

"Encourage him to avoid responsibilities. Tell him to let the 'eager beavers' do it. "Don't tell him he's wrong. That word can set up serious frustrations and give him the feeling he's being persecuted.

"Be a 'buddy.' Let him treat you the way he treats his friends, calls you by your first name and speaks only slang. It proves you're 'hep.' "Let your children hear family quarrels. They'll realize that marriage isn't exactly a bed of roses.
