

Discoveries of Science To Be Discussed Sunday

Speaking at the First Baptist Church of Palos Verdes Sunday, Aug. 19, will be Dr. J. Stuart Hydanus.

Dr. Hydanus has held several pastorates, conducted Evangelistic and Bible Conferences, and has campaigned throughout the United States and Canada. He is also a member of the faculty at the Los Angeles Baptist Theological Seminary.

The topic of the Sunday evening program at 7 p.m. will be, "The Amazing Discoveries of Science, Astronomy and Archaeology Showing the Wonderful Accuracy of the Bible."

Some of the facts to be featured will be Adam naming the animals; Science and the Creation of Man; The earth divided in the days of Peleg; The earth shook out of its place; The sand upon the sea shore, its scientific significances; The whole earth of one language and one speech; The mystery of ice, dust, and clouds; Science and the long day of Joshua; Jonah and the whale; Ruined remains of Tower of Babel, found unfinished as stated in the Bible; The message of the Gos-

pel in a snowflake; The treasures of snow and hail; Snow and hail reserved against the day of battle and war.

Sunday morning at 11 a.m. Dr. Hylanus will speak on the subject, "That I May Know Him."

Society Suggests Solution For Boredom—'Get a Pet'

"Now that school has been out for a while, are the children becoming a little bored and restless, with too much time and too little to do?" asks the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. The society offers a solution: adopt a pet.

A dog or cat not only provides good companionship and fun for boys and girls, the care of a pet teaches the valuable lesson of responsibility for a dependent, the society stresses.

The child who learns to accept such responsibility grows up to be a more stable, dependable adult—a better citizen. And through the personal training of a dog or cat, that child is helped to understand the "why" of adult rules and regulations—learning that these are laid down with a worthwhile purpose, not simply to spoil children's pleasure, the society added.

JUVENILE CRIME
Recent increases in juvenile crime, and the refusal of many young people to submit to any authority, including that of the police, indicates that a number of youngsters today do not understand that there are good reasons behind a community's laws, according to George Crosier, SPCA general manager.

The child who trains a pet

to obey reasonable rules can better understand the purpose of laws and the need for observance of these laws, Crosier adds.

Adopting an animal from the SPCA is somewhat like adopting a baby, the society head points out. The family interested in obtaining a pet is screened before an animal is placed. As in placement of an infant, the suitability of a pet selected is also checked, to assure a pleasant life for both family and animal.

EXAMPLE
For example, a small, excitable dog would not be given to a family with young children; such a family would be far happier with a calmer, sturdier canine who would enjoy romping and playing with the children.

Similarly, the more high-strung animal would be happier with an adult or semi-adult, where the atmosphere would be quieter, and where a larger dog, requiring more physical exercise and excitement, might be miserable, the society pointed out.

Hibiscus Plants Prosper Here, Explains CAN

The exotic tropical Hibiscus is one of summer's joys in California. Hibiscus is at its best in Torrance, since the temperate climate coaxes such a long period of bloom out of it.

Nurserymen in southern California have the longest list of named Hibiscus, there being 20 or more varieties to choose from. But C.A.N. members elsewhere are stocking increasing numbers of them as their popularity spreads.

Named Hibiscus varieties to look for include the familiar rose - pink Agnes Gault, the double golden-yellow Crown of Bohemia, the ruffled-pink Ross Estey, the vividly-red single President and the lovely double-pink variety Kona. One of the best known and brightest reds is Brillante. Some of these are occasionally found trained to small tree form, and a spectacular small tree they make.

Like roses, and unlike Lantana, the Hibiscus is a gross feeder and drinker. Given plenty of food and water, plus a good thick mulch of steer manure, it will respond with continuous good summer growth. And, as it is with roses, also, it's the new growth that brings new bloom.
