

# How to Be Beautiful On Job Demonstrated

The fundamentals of beauty for the secretary on the job were explained Thursday night at the Vagabond restaurant in Los Angeles to the South Bay Secretaries Association.

Giving the presentation on beauty was Miss Suzi Crandall of John Robert Powers charm school. Miss Crandall has a television program, "Time Out for Beauty," on Saturdays at 11 a.m. on channel 11.

"Be yourself; know yourself," stressed the commentator numerous times during the program. She explained that there is no formula for beauty that will fit all women.

"Each woman must dress

according to her height, coloring and even personality," she commented.

Miss Crandall displayed the seven basic lines in women's clothing and explained the hows, whens and whos for each. For example, she showed the vertical line and explained it was ideal for shorter women. The example of a "shorter" woman, she explained, is one five foot five or under.

The horizontal line, she explained, is for the tall, narrow woman. "You can have a lot of fun with this line," she mentioned. Then she demonstrated how the horizontal line can be put at the shoulders to broaden

hips to broaden hips.

"Black, though often a lifesaver because of its antidart qualities, can be a woman's enemy," Miss Crandall said. She put a piece of black cloth around her face to show how black emphasizes lines.

"Black even makes lines show up on babies," she added. To be able to wear black, a touch of white or color, maybe at the neck, with a piece of jewelry or with a scarf, can be added, she explained.

"The most essential step to beauty," Miss Crandall stressed, "lies not in what you wear or how you apply your make up.

"Although these may be necessary supplements to beauty, the most essential step must be within you. You must think beautiful thoughts.

"Don't let your thoughts be critical," she stressed, for when your thoughts are critical, a critical expression is reflected on your face. Nobody can act well enough to cover up critical, unhappy thoughts," she concluded.
