

El Camino Announces Additions to Faculty

Two music instructors, a librarian, and new instructors in art, home economics and cosmetology will be among additions to the El Camino College faculty when classes assemble Sept. 11 for the fall semester.

Joining the instructional division headed by Harold Wennstrom, Ralph L. Mills and Miss Jane Skinner will join the music faculty. Mills will direct the college community orchestra and teach classes in music appreciation and instrumental music. Miss Skinner will direct the college choir and vocal ensemble and instruct courses in music fundamentals and music appreciation.

Mills' educational background includes work at Arlington State College in Texas, San Jose State College, McMurray College in Abilene, Tex., where he received his bachelor of science degree, and at the University of Southern California, from which he received a master's degree in music. He is completing work for the doctorate at USC at present.

With 12 years of experience in teaching choral music, Miss Skinner comes directly from Philadelphia, where she was employed for the past year as a staff member of Singing City. Educated at Pomona College of the Pacific, and USC, she has taught in California schools of El Monte and Los Angeles. Her most recent teaching experience was at USC.

Ray B. Engelke of Glendale will become a member of the college library staff, after holding a similar position at Los Angeles Valley College in a student capacity.

On completion of work toward the associate in arts degree at Los Angeles City

College, Engelke received his BA in political science from the University of California at Los Angeles. Working in the graduate library school of USC, he obtained his master of science in library science and his librarianship credential through that university.

Lawrence R. Macaray, a part-time instructor at El Camino during the past year while teaching in the Torrance secondary schools, will become a full-time member of the art department, also headed by Wennstrom.

A graduate of Santa Ana College, where he received his associate in arts degree, Macaray received his master's in art from Long Beach State College and his bachelor's degree from Whittier College. He also studied at Marietta College in Ohio.

Before teaching at Torrance High School, he was a member of the faculty of Long Beach Poly High. He has also operated his own business, the Larry Macaray Art Service, in Anaheim.

Mrs. Jessie Buck, a native of Mississippi and now a resident of Hermosa Beach, will become a full-time member of the cosmetology faculty in the technical arts division, headed by Horace Bates.

In addition to professional experience in the field of cosmetology, Mrs. Buck has taught previously at Redondo Union High School, Riverside City College, El Camino and Dedman-Williams School. Her education was secured at Sunflower Junior College in Moorhead, Miss., Los Angeles Trade Technical College, Hollywood College of Chiropractic and the University of California at Los Angeles.

Candidate Talks on Election At Appearance in Torrance

"The outcome of the California election will be decided well before November," State Controller Alan Cranston warned a meeting of the 17th Congressional District Democrats recently at the Higgins Brickyard patio room in Torrance.

Calling for a "redoubled registration effort in Los Angeles County," Cranston, Democratic candidate for reelection as Controller, pointed out that "Democratic registration in this key county dropped 140,000 between the 1960 election and the recent primary while Republican registration went down only 50,000."

Toastmaster at the rally was Roger West, former president of Torrance Democrats, Inc. The fund raising event was arranged by David Lyman, Torrance chairman of the Re-Elect Cranston Controller Committee and current president of Torrance Democrats Inc.

DANCE MUSIC

Music for dancing was provided by the Jadran Trio. A barbershop quartet sang and Dr. Frank Sullivan, professor of English at Loyola, gave a dramatic presentation.

Registration closes Sept. 13, Cranston said, "and we must make up by then the ground we have lost since 1960 if we expect to win in November."

"State-wide Democratic registration has declined 300,000 since 1960, while the Republican drop was only 83,000," according to Cranston, "and don't forget that Nixon won that 1960 election in California," he added with emphasis.

URGES SUPPORT

Cranston urged Democrats to volunteer at their local party headquarters as deputy registrars. "The material is ready and the procedure is easy," Cranston said. "What is needed desperately are the people to actually sign up the unregistered voters."

Cranston suggested voter

apathy as a possible cause of the severe Democratic registration decline. "More than 150,000 fewer Democrats voted in the Governor's race in this year's primary than in 1948," the Democratic leader pointed out. "The Republicans attracted 300,000 more voters this time than in 1958," he added, "making a net loss to the Democrats of 450,000 votes."

Cranston called for "a livelier campaign on the Democratic side to build up the turnout in November. If you don't register," he said, "you can't vote, and others will then have the power to make decisions that will effect you every day."

Torrance Tops Slated Goal

Torrance Community Saving Bonds Chairman George W. Post recently disclosed Savings Bonds sales for this area for the year to date of \$1,430,240 have exceeded the Freedom Bond goal.

Previously announced objective was to fund cost of a \$1,100,000 Polaris Missile.

Sales for July of this year were \$209,700.

In releasing the figures the volunteer Savings Bonds executive said:

"Americans have responded as never before except during war years when the conflict was a hot and shooting one. They seem to sense the Space Race, scientific research and weapons purchase, which their Savings Bonds dollars assist, are vital props for survival of this free country."

"Thus they are responding in massive fashion to the President's challenge: 'Ask not what your country can do for you but what you can do for your country.'"

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
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
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
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
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
