

Marina Amateur Radio Club Offers Class at North High

The Marina Amateur Radio Club is offering several classes this fall. The courses will cover fundamental theory; CW of International Morse Code; practical applications of theory and bench practice.

Instruction, held in room 108 of North High School, was held Monday night, last night and will be held tonight. At this time, a "get acquainted" session will be held to inform students on textbooks necessary and to give the first assignment.

The beginners' code class will be conducted Monday nights by Charles F. Taylor, WA6YRY, of Redondo Beach. Taylor was in communications in the Navy during World War II and is a graduate of a class offered by Marina. The new class is intended for those desiring to enter into this hobby of amateur radio.

SPEED PRACTICE
A speed practice class in C. W. reception will be held on Wednesday nights upon demand.

Persons now holding general class amateur licenses and wishing to extend their theory knowledge toward obtaining the amateur extra ticket may want to attend the 40-week course available Tuesdays.

The detailed exploitation of test and measurements by instruments of working models and projects will be under direction of Hardy Glenn, WURZB, Torrance. Glenn is current president of the Marina Club.

BASIC THEORY
The Wednesday night class in basic theory is designed to assist the novice amateur to convert his temporary ticket to the much-coveted general class modification.

Gary McQueeney, instructor, was first licensed as K2KAZ in New York. He has since held K5YGP and K7RTU and is now WB6AWS of Redondo Beach. Mc-

Queeney served as an alternate code - theory teacher during his tour of military duty and with other clubs.

The Marina Amateur Radio Club was established as a service organization to assist individual operating proficiency.

Applications will be available at the door as the class convenes tonight.

Teachers' Art Class Offered Instructors

Art for Elementary Teachers, a college course with two units of fully transferable credit in the education curriculum will be offered in the Evening Division of Harbor College during the Fall Semester, according to an announcement by Mr. Laurel Baker, Chairman of the Construction and Art Division.

The class meets Friday from 6:30 to 9:30. There is no prerequisite for the course.

Alyse Harrell, new instructor in the course, is an elementary art supervisor for the Los Angeles City Schools where she advises teachers on art media suitable for elementary children.

TRAVELS
Her travels have taken her through the United States, Mexico, and South America; she has just completed a year's trip around the world by cargo liner. Mrs. Harrell, a graduate of Fresno State College, completed graduate work at the University of California, University of Southern California, UCLA, as well as the University of Mexico. She obtained a Master's degree at Long Beach State College.

The course, Art 10, for Elementary Teachers, is designed to meet the needs of the elementary teacher in the classroom. It emphasizes the study of design and color using simple materials found in an elementary school. The course will include painting with tempera, as well as design with paint, crayon, and chalk. Some basic three-dimensional craft will be explored, such as paper construction, papier mache, and vermiculite carving.

CREATIVITY
Creativity is stressed but special attention is paid to the development of good classroom organization by the prospective teacher. Special effort is made to equip present and future teachers with a better understanding of the art needs of elementary children.

Registration for evening classes is by appointment. New applicants for the Evening Division should apply early so that entrance tests may be completed and transcripts of previous work obtained. Applications are available at the Admissions Office of the College.

"We are pleased to be able to obtain such a well qualified person as Alyse Harrell as a new instructor in the art course for elementary teachers," stated Mr. Baker.

The exercise began with a hypothetical limited war situation which escalated rapidly and culminated in a supposed general war.

The special exercise was commanded by Vice Admiral R.T.S. Keith, commander of the First Fleet.
