

Lesson-Sermon Talk Features 'Reality' Topic

"Reality" will be the subject of the lesson-sermon at Christian Science church services Sunday.

Paul's advice to the Philippians is included in the Scriptural readings: "Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any

praise, think on these things" (Philippians 4).

Among the selections to be read from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy is this brief definition of reality: "Reality is spiritual, harmonious, immutable, immortal, divine, eternal" (p. 335).

The Golden Text is from Deuteronomy (32): "Ascribe greatness unto our God. He is the Rock, his work is perfect."

Church Observes Promotion Day During Services

Narbonne Avenue Baptist Church of Lomita will observe Promotion Day Sunday in Sunday School and Training Union.
