The Pen and Quill was selected as the setting for the unique social affair because a survey of Southern California's recognized national celebrities indicated it was the most convenient location. Owner-president of the hotel, Robert Reuben of Manhattan Beach, has been included in "Who's Who" for several editions.

An informal, get-acquainted reception will begin at 7 p.m., Oct. 25. The banquet will be served at 8 p.m. in the "Manhattan Room," to be followed by a special program for the distinguished guests, their families and friends.
