Construction to Start on Bank

Groundbreaking ceremonies Oct. 1 marked the start of construction for Guaranty Bank's permanent structure located at Hawthorne Blvd., just south of Del Amo Shopping Center in Torrance.

The building, with land and adjoining lot, will represent an investment in excess of \$300,000.

Construction of the building is a milestone in the bank's progress since its opening in interim quarters last April. Community response to the independent bank is indicated by a more than \$3 million asset total for its first five-month period of operation.

Developed in response to the area's need for locally-managed independent banking, Guaranty Bank is the first independent to come into the South Bay district in the past eight years. It is the only independent bank in the City of Torrance.

NEW STRUCTURE

The bank's new structure will be over 8,000 sq. ft. It will be a contemporary one-story and messanine building of Dutch white face brick rising above a glass and marble street level facade. The interior of the Class A building will feature terrazzo floors, suspended acoustical tile ceiling with recessed lighting, and many other modern innovations. The bank's adjoining parking lot will accommodate 300 cars.

Designed by Heusel, Holmka and Associates, the structure is expected to be completed by March 1. Contractor for the job is Pozzo Construction Co.

FINEST PRIVATE

P. Keith Hall, president of Guaranty Bank, said, "Our bank has been designed to be one of the finest private banking facilities constructed in California. When it is completed, we will continue to offer our customers not only the highest standards

of banking services, but also the most convenient and attractive banking atmosphere in the area."

Hall said the area population has more than doubled during the past eight years, and a real service has been performed by Guaranty Bank in the five months since its opening. Intensive knowledge of the district's business and industry has been an asset in mobilizing financial resources for the benefit of the South Bay.

LOCAL INTERESTS

The bank was established to serve local interests, with local management, and to offer the public the many advantages of independent banking, according to Hall.

Guaranty Bank will continue to conduct business as usual in its interim quarters until the new building is completed.




