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Letters to the Editor

Editor: While campaigning during recent months, I have frequently been asked questions about my stand on the Customs House site. This is a vital matter for the South Bay, and one that seems to have the attention of many of our residents.

First, I am among those who favor Reeves Field as the proper location for the facility. I believe it meets all the tests of accessibility, availability of land, nearness to the Harbor, and so forth. I believe, however, that progressive thinking must go further than the question "Where should the Customs House be located?"

There is little question but that the South Bay area needs an infusion of new business. An already depressed shipbuilding industry must look to even fur-

ther decline in work as a result of the loss of the 6 percent differential. Much of our shipping has moved to Long Beach. The fishing industry is suffering from foreign competition, and the new Trade Expansion Bill, according to industry spokesmen, could spell the death knoll of 3,000 to 5,000 jobs which we can ill afford to lose.

A good part of these difficulties stem from a new concept of international trade. Whether we agree with it or not, and I am not one of those who accepts it blindly, the philosophy of our government is to greater foreign trade and freer trade among nations. Why not turn this very adverse position into an advantageous one? I think it is possible by developing a much needed International House complex in conjunction with the Customs. While not an entirely new idea, I believe it has not yet had the planning and push necessary to accomplish it.

Since seeking Congressional office, I have studied our local problems and, in particular, have researched the experience of others in the area of international trade. These experiences have been nothing short of miraculous when there was proper planning, enthusiasm, cooperation, and interest on the parts of local and national officials. New Orleans, starting from scratch in 1945, has developed an International House and an International Trade Mart that has made it one of our most active ports handling a yearly volume of over \$2 billion. Its history is nothing short of miraculous.

I envision that in the Los Angeles Harbor, we could establish with private funds, under proper conditions, and in conjunction with our Customs House, our own International House where visiting foreign businessmen and our own businessmen could meet. Billingual secretaries and assistance in locating markets would be made

available. Hotel and dining room facilities would be provided, along with offices and libraries. In addition, an International Trade Mart would be established where goods of all countries could be on display for sale or trade. Finally an International Consular building would complete the program.

If we continue to let other areas dominate us in Washington, if we continue to lie down on the job, we will be

in growing trouble here in the South Bay area.

On the other hand, with vigorous leadership we can move ahead and build on our great opportunities.

In expressing my Customs House "stand" to your readers it is with the hope that they will "stand with me" in the desire to move ahead and in the dedication of accomplishing that goal.
