

# Home Employes May Lose Security Benefits

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Mr. Davis, district manager of the Torrance Social Security District Office, has written the following article as a public service in order to better acquaint Torrance residents with their rights under the Social Security Act.)

hold employees working by the day, the week, or throughout the year, may unknowingly be doing them an injustice by failing to report their earnings for social security purposes. Any cleaning woman, maid, cook, baby sitter, or handyman, who works for as much pay as \$50 every three months should have his or her earnings reported and the social security taxes

paid. If a maid comes to your house to do cleaning or laundry as infrequently as one day a week and is paid as little as \$3.85 for her day's work, her earnings must be reported if she continues to work for you each week in the calendar quarter and earns \$50 or more. The law has been on the books since 1951, but it is estimated that there still are

many, many householders employing domestic servants part or full-time who are failing to comply. The householder frequently does not learn of the law's application to him until his employe makes a claim for social security benefits. In many cases, the employer may be faced with a staggering bill for back taxes, interest and penalties, not only for the employer contributions to social security but for the employe's share of the contributions as well. All employers who pay domestics \$50 cash wages in a quarter or more should get in touch with the Internal Avenue Service with-


