

Second Sabin Clinics Undergo Final Planning

TORRANCE — Planning for the second series of Sabin polio vaccine immunization clinics Dec. 2 and 9 is nearly complete, the Los Angeles County Medical Association reported today.

More than three million Los Angeles County residents immunized against Type I polio at the clinics held in October.

Second phase clinics will be similar to the October clinics and in the same locations.

Dr. Reginald Smart, chairman, public health committee, Los Angeles County Medical Association, again stressed these points:

1. All residents, children and adults, should obtain Sabin oral vaccine protection, even if they have previously had Salk vaccine shots. (Sabin vaccine "clears" those who may be unwitting carriers of polio, which Salk vaccine does not.)

2. The Sabin vaccine is taken orally, on a cube of sugar or in a sip of syrup. No needle is used and it is painless.

3. A donation of 25 cents is being asked for each dose of Sabin polio vaccine, but no one will be turned away for lack of funds.

4. Epidemic polio can be wiped out in any U.S. community if the public continues to participate in the Sabin immunization program as fully as in the past.

5. All those who missed taking their Type I Sabin vaccine on October 21 and 28, are urged to get it from their own private physicians. However, if a person has not already taken Type I, he can still take Type II on Dec. 2 and 9, then take Type I at a later date at this doctor's office.

Information concerning addresses of all December clinics will again be run in local newspapers, and available through some Southern California radio and television stations, as was previously done for the October clinics.

Records Course Open at School

The bookkeeping and records keeping course at Torrance Evening High School has openings for new enrollees, according to Raymond E. Collins, Principal. No prior training is necessary. The double entry method of bookkeeping is applied to financial record keeping for business, social and personal use.

Projects and practice bookkeeping sets are used to give the student practice in performing bookkeeping tasks commonly found in business. The student learns to prepare buying and selling records, cash controls records, payrolls, withholding tax reports, and accounts payable and receivable records.

This semester, for the first time, the course will include instruction on a bookkeeping machine. In addition, automatic calculators and adding machine will be available for use by the students.
