Special Program Slated For Seeking Legal Officers

The Air Force has announced a special program has been instituted to meet the rising demand for legal officers. The U.S. Force Judge Advocate General Commissioning program is now offering direct commissions in the grade of first lieutenant through colonel, depending on the individual's age, education, and experience. According to SSgt. William C. Edwards, local Air Force Recruiter, whose office is at 1329 1/2 Sartori Ave., applicants for commissions must be graduates of an accredited law school and be members of the bar of a Federal court or of the highest court of a state. Senior students of an accredited law school may apply up to 30 days prior to graduation, but documentary evidence of graduation and admission to the bar must be submitted before

final acceptance can be made. Accepted applicants attend a four week basic legal officer orientation course at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, Tex., prior to a regular duty assignment. The minimum tour of duty is for three years. Sergeant Edwards said some of the challenging fields of law in which an Air Force judge advocate may be engaged in are foreign law, military justice, procurement, claims, tax and litigation, patents, military affairs, legal assistance to Air Force members and advisory capacity on policy involving Air Force functions. MEDITERRANEAN (FHTNC) — Herbert S. Wright Jr., chief boilerman, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert S. Wright, Sr. of 1250 E. Renton St., Torrance, is serving aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Enterprise, which took part in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) fall training maneuvers, Sept. 23 to Oct. 3, in the Mediterranean.

The exercises, involving nearly 13,000 men and 23 ships, centered around the coast of Macedonia, Greece. All United States units involved were part of the Sixth Fleet. They included an aircraft carrier, a cruiser, two guided missile frigates, six destroyers, seven amphibious ships and four minesweepers.

Commanding the NATO forces was Vice Admiral David L. McDonald, Commander, Naval Striking and Support Forces, Southern Europe. He also is Commander, Sixth Fleet. Military units of the United Kingdom, Greece and Turkey were among the forces participating in the maneuvers.

Whole Blood from Red Cross to Hospitals

Four hospitals in Torrance and two in Harbor City were supplied with a total of 5,671 pints of whole blood through Red Cross during the past year.

These six hospitals were among the more than 200 in Los Angeles and Orange Counties whose blood supply from Red Cross exceeded 165,000 pints.

All of the blood was provided by volunteer donors and most of it was collected at bloodmobiles like the one scheduled at the Torrance Elks Lodge No. 1948, 1820 Abalone, from 2:30 to 7 p.m. Nov. 29.

Especially conscious of the vital services provided by the Red Cross blood program are hospital administrators Robert Lyon, Frank Cooper, Robert Eislebin and Frank Kredel, who also serve as members of the Torrance-Lomita Red Cross branch board of directors.

Cooper reports that 533 pints of Red Cross supplied blood were used by patients at Torrance Memorial during the past year.

Riviera's supply of Red Cross blood totaled 496, according to Lyons. Eislebin says Little Company of Mary patients had the benefits of 405 pints of Red Cross blood.

Roy Harbor Osteopathic hospital's administrator, Kredel, reports his facility's supply from Red Cross amounted to 352 pints.

Harbor General lead the list of six hospitals in its supply of blood from Red Cross with 2,597 pints — 1,034 more than received the previous year. Kaiser Foundation patients utilized 1,278 pints of Red Cross blood.

Because this is a volunteer program, Red Cross is able to make blood available

at all times with only minimal charges for processing and handling in the hospitals.

This last program of community service has been made possible by volunteer donors whose continued support is essential, says Mrs. Robert Orsini, blood program chairman for the Torrance-Lomita ARC branch.

"As the blood program continues to grow, additional donors are needed. At each of our bloodmobiles the welcome mat is out for new donors as well as those who have given blood through Red Cross in the past.

Appointments to give blood at the forthcoming community blood bank may be made by calling Mrs. Orsini at FA 8-0647 between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.

"Giving blood through Red Cross when a person is physically able assures that donor and/or a member of his family who may need blood in the future that it will be available and supplied without charge from Red Cross."

Mrs. Orsini says although Red Cross was able to supply 65 percent of all blood used by patients in L.A. and Orange Counties last year, 35 percent of those needing blood were forced to buy it from commercial sources.

Commercially collected blood costs the patient about five times more than blood obtained through Red Cross.

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Tips To Ease Floor Chore
