Cakes with Yeast Retain Moisture

Whenever I mention making cakes with yeast in them, my audience usually wrinkles up their collective nose. To American women, the idea of yeast outside of its use in bread or raised doughnuts is unheard of.

Europeans, however, use yeast in cakes and the results are enough to make any lover of moist tender baked goods fight to get the recipe.

Louis P. D. Gouy, master chef, and author of "The Gold Cook Book," says of his chocolate yeast cake, "Let them eat cake—but have a real cake and not a spurious imitation. It is better to eat a corn muffin than a poor cake."

CHOCOLATE CAKE

Cream one cup of butter until very light and fluffy. Gradually add two cups of granulated sugar. Work in three well beaten egg yolks, a little at a time. Be sure to

cream and beat after each addition.

Add three squares of melted—unsweetened chocolate alternately with one cup of rich cold milk which you have previously mixed with ½ cake of dry yeast dissolved in ¼ cup of lukewarm water.

Blend thoroughly. Sift 2¼ cups of cake flour and ½ tsp. of salt four times. Gradually add to the first mixture. Mix well then fold in three stiffly beaten egg whites. Now cover the bowl and put in refrigerator overnight.

In the morning, stir in ½ tsp. of vanilla or 1 tsp. of vanilla and ½ tsp. of almond extract. Blend thoroughly. Turn batter into two buttered cake pans (9x9x3 inches) and bake in a moderate oven (350 F) for 40 to 45 minutes, or until firm. Cool and fill layers with a chocolate French cream and frost with a fudge frosting.
