Torrance to Get Whirl at Curling Sport

Local sports expects will have a new subject to bone up on when the Granite Curling Club of Torrance holds their first game, Nov. 19 at the Olympic Ice Arena, 6 to 8 p.m.

For those not in the know, curling is played on ice with stones weighing 42½ pounds each. Curling although originally played in Scotland some 300 years ago, is now a favorite sport in Canada. The Canadians are currently world champions.

This ice sport is played on lanes 126 feet long from the starting (hack) line to the scoring circle, called a tee line. Teams are comprised of four players and they are called a rink.

Object of the game is to "curl" a stone into the scoring circle. This is done with a curling broom. Made of straw and specifically designed for curling, the brooms come with a round "T" or flat shape to them.

Harriers Attempt to Reup with Knights


Hosting San Diego City College Friday, El Camino harriers attempted to recover from a recent 15-40 defeat by Long Beach.

Racers Compete At Ascot Park

Headed by Frank Secrist of Bakersfield, six more drivers yesterday signed to compete in this Friday and Saturday nights, First Annual World Championship Modified car racing program at Ascot Park, 183rd St. and So. Vermont Ave. in Gardena, where racing will begin at 8:15 p.m. each night.

The race which will pay a record \$4025 purse, and a guaranteed \$1000 to the winner of the 100 lap championship main event, will be open to all types of racing cars including Sprint Cars,

Midgets, Sportsman, Super-Modifieds, Stock Cars, Hard Tops, Hot Rods, Jalopies, and the new Flying Wings.

Secrist, currently ranked ninth in NASCAR National Modified car racing point standings, will wheel a Chevrolet powered car owned by the Varner Bros. of Oildale.

A nationally known racing star, holds the one lap track record for Modified-Sportsman type cars on the 2½ mile Daytona Beach Florida International Raceway at a record 155.911 miles per hour driving a T-bird powered car. This is five miles per hour faster than Parnelli Jones, Indianapolis 500 mile qualifying record.


The 32 year old speedster who is a truck mechanic when not racing, will be making his first appearance on the one-half mile dirt track at Ascot.
