



It is devised to poke gentle and not-so-gentle barbs at our sometimes wacky community and its inhabitants, and to give an affectionate salute or two when they fit.


Most importantly, this is happy entertainment guaranteed to send you out of the theatre at least a bit more cheerful than when you went in.

Adjectives, Opera Mix

Adjectives and opera have nothing in common unless you happen to be an English teacher who sings. And that's exactly what Frederick Milstein, El Camino College instructor, does.

In 1956 Milstein, traveled to Europe to study music at the Vienna State Academy. While there he was chosen to sing the baritone solo in the world premiere of Egon Lustgarten's "Song of Nome."

After his performance he was awarded a scholarship for the next year to study under German baritone Hans Hotter.

A graduate of UCLA, Milstein began his singing career at UCLA and LA City College in their opera workshops. While in school he appeared in musicals, operas and Shakespearean roles.

In 1955 he was awarded the Akiba award for outstanding contribution to Jewish culture by the University religious conference division of Hillel.

Milstein received his first full-year contract in the opera house of Biel, Switzerland in 1959. During the year he appeared in six leading roles.

Paving Project Bids OK'd, February Completion Seen

Plans for improvement of Highridge Rd. from Hawthorne Blvd. to Crest Rd., were approved this week by the Board of Supervisors.

Bids for construction work will be opened by the board Dec. 18.

Project design was approved by the Los Angeles County Road Department under supervision of N. H. Temple, road commissioner.

Work is scheduled for completion in February.

Included in the improvement will be new asphaltic concrete pavement to provide a two-lane highway with paved shoulders. The 1.5-mile project will include all necessary excavation, embankment and subgrade work.

Ultimately the roadway will be constructed to full master plan width.

Approximately 1,500 feet of curbs and gutters were installed by subdivision developers.

"This project is necessary," Supervisor Burton Chace said, "to provide direct access to residential and industrial areas now under development on the Palos Verdes Peninsula."
