

Blood Campaign Nets Record Participation

An all-time record was rolled up for a blood collection in Torrance when 336 persons turned out for the Red Cross Bloodmobile which visited Elks Lodge 1938, 1820 Abalone, Thursday.

Mrs. Robert Orsini, chairman of the blood program for the Torrance - Lomita Red Cross branch said, "It's a pleasure to work with the blood program when you see how our community supports it and of their dependence on it."
