Construction to Begin On New Baptist Church

Construction on Del Amo Southern Baptist Church will get underway this way at 226th Street and Ocean Avenue in the Del Amo Center.

After dedication service at the church site following the morning worship last Sunday, ground was broken for the first unit of an extended building plan.

Turning the first spade was Mrs. Ann Rumbaugh, 20831 Felkner Dr., and her three children.

Mrs. Rumbaugh was the first local resident to answer the newspaper challenge to participate in the founding of a new Southern Baptist Church in the Del Amo Center area.

Others who had a part in the ground breaking were Earl May, 23023 Kathryn Ave., deacons of the church, organizational leaders, and church officers.

Kirk Gillett, general contractor, was presented to the congregation.

First unit will be a two-story educational building with a chapel containing 7200 square feet, the unit will provide Sunday School and Training Union facilities for an initial attend-

ance of 300. Second unit will be a three-story educational and recreational building, to be followed with the main auditorium plan at a later date.

The congregation is at present in temporary quarters in the Masonic Temple, 2326 Cabrillo Ave. Daniel B. Beaver, Jr. is pastor.



BRIDE'S BRAZILIAN RECIPES

1/2 cup cooking oil
1 pkg. frozen peas
Brown meat in cooking oil; add onions, garlic, chopped tomatos, vinegar, parsley. Add beef gravy, stirring together well. Simmer half an hour.
Cook rice. Heat peas. When meat is ready, spread half of the rice on the bottom of casserole. Pour meat, peas, chopped eggs in layers. Cover with remaining rice. Slice bananas horizontally, making three slices from each. Fry in oil until brown. Place on top of rice; sprinkle with parmesan cheese. Bake at 325° for 20 min. Serves four.

CANJA

(Thick Chicken Soup)
1 chicken (about 2 1/2 lbs.) cut into serving pieces
2 medium size tomatoes
1 medium size onion chopped in small pieces
1/2 clove chopped garlic
1 tsp. chopped parsley
1 tbs. vinegar
salt and pepper to taste
1 to 3 cup of washed uncooked rice
3 large carrots cut in round slices
6 cups of water.

Put water in medium size pot. Add cut chicken. All all ingredients except rice. Cover and bring to fast boil. Turn to medium heat and cook half hour. Remove chicken.

Add rice to soup and let cook another half hour. Remove skin and bones from

chicken and cut into small pieces. Add cut chicken to soup and simmer five minutes. Soup should have consistency of stew.

Tastes best if made ahead of time and reheated at time of eating. Serves four.

TOASTS DE QUEIJO E BANANA

(Banana-cheese toasts)
1 loaf white bread, sliced thin
12 oz. American cheese
3 oz. parmesan cheese
1 1/2 tsp. soft butter or margarine
3 medium size bananas cut in round slices
1/4 tsp. Worcestershire

Cut off edges of crust from slices of bread. Split each slice in four little squares. With a fork, mash cheeses, add butter and mix until it turns into a creamed paste. Add more butter if necessary.

Add Worcestershire sauce. Spoon a little of the paste in the center of one small square of bread, top with another piece and press lightly.

Spray thick layer of paste on top and press banana slice lightly on top of cheese paste. Arrange squares of bread in cooking tray, sides touching.

Place in preheated 350° oven for 20 minutes until cheese is melted and turns golden color. Serve immediately. May be served as hors d'oeuvre or as accompaniment to tamato soup.
