

Satellite Explosion Lights Sky

TORRANCE — An exploding booster rocket from a Navy satellite lighted Torrance skies Tuesday night, prompting hundreds of telephone calls to police switchboards and newspapers.

Fourth Death Logged

TORRANCE — This city's traffic death toll mounted to four this week as a 69-year-old pedestrian succumbed to accident injuries suffered Friday.

Dead is Robert A. Hamilton, 1639 1/2 Cabrillo Ave. Police say Hamilton walked into the path of a car on Torrance Blvd. near Cravens Ave.

The driver was not held. Hamilton was in critical condition at Harbor General Hospital with head injuries. He died Monday.

In another accident, a Lomita man was booked on suspicion of felony hit-run driving after a teen-age pedestrian was injured.

Jailed is Charles R. Bell, 29, of 2018 W. Pacific Coast Highway. California Highway Patrolmen said Bell's truck struck 16-year-old Louis Meadors while the youth walked on Lomita Blvd.

Meadors, 1653 W. 227th St., is in satisfactory condition at Harbor General Hospital with internal injuries, police say.

Witnesses said Bell fled the accident scene, but the truck was spotted shortly afterward.

The twisting, blue flame trailed colorfully into a ball of bright, white light, creating a phenomenon previously unseen in Southland skies.

Residents as far north as San Francisco and as far east as Utah got a peek at the display, but Torrance residents got the best look of all.

The Navy said the explosion was created by its Transit 5-A satellite, carried into orbit by an Air Force Blue Scout 4-stage rocket.

Colored spirals of flame, laced with vapor trails from first and second stages of the rocket's flight, and the display rivaled any Fourth of July exhibition ever recorded.

Air force spokesmen said the display would not have been visible except that the descending sun's rays caught the rocket as it shot skyward shortly before 5:30 p.m.

The Transit weighs 38,000 pounds and is 74 feet tall.

Hospital Move Slightly Late

CARSON—Harbor General Hospital will move from its "temporary" headquarters Jan. 25, but the changeover will be slightly overdue.

The move originally was scheduled in 1950, but lack of a new home delayed it some 13 years.

County officials, who have scheduled dedication ceremonies for their new, \$15 million hospital facility Jan. 14, say it will rival the biggest and best county hospitals in the nation.

A. L. Thomas, hospital administrator, said the move from present World War II, 75-acre, 101-building Army barracks will be accomplished in three days, Jan. 25 through 27.

The new facility adjoins the old hospital on Carson St. between Normandie and

Vermont Aves.

It serves a population area of approximately a million, comprising most of Southwest Los Angeles County.

Some 600 county and city officials will participate in groundbreaking ceremonies Jan. 14, with Supervisor Burton W. Chace, in whose district the hospital lies, as master of ceremonies.

Members of the public have been invited to attend. Program begins at 10:30 a.m.

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CITY COUNCIL ACTION:

Mass Reaction Delays Victor Plan Approval

TORRANCE — Mass opposition of area property owners has temporarily halted the city's master plan for Victor Precinct.

Councilmen, originally expected to okay the plan Tuesday night, withheld action until a council study committee could iron out wrinkles which triggered resident disapproval.

Presented by Planning Director Charles Shartle, the plan would bring rezoning from M-1 manufacturing to C-3 commercial and R-3 residential along many streets bounded generally by Del Amo Blvd., Henrietta St., Torrance Blvd. and Hawthorne Blvd.

Spokesmen for the opposition objected on various grounds, but generally agreed that rezoning would not be compatible with present usage.

An attorney representing

a pet hospital on Hawthorne Blvd., where zoning would be changed from M-1 to C-3 under the plan, said the area now includes a body and fender shop, ready-mix cement yard, masonry storage and equipment rental.

"It just doesn't seem logical to change it," he said.

In other action City Manager Wade Peebles informed councilmen that a Santa Fe Railroad vice president will visit Torrance early in 1963 to help resolve a dispute be-

tween the city and the utility over a proposed site for South Bay State College.

Major Albert Isen attacked Gov. Brown's omission of Torrance in a recent study on urban affairs, saying a letter should be sent Brown expressing dissatisfaction.

"We're being ignored," Isen said, "and I resent it. His motion won unanimous approval."

Councilmen authorized city employees to take half a day off either the day before New Year's or the day before Christmas.

Find Bank Getaway Car

TORRANCE — Police today found a 1957 Chevrolet used Tuesday in the \$25,000 holdup of a Hollywood Riviera Bank.

There was no trace of the gunmen. Detectives said the getaway car was found parked

at the rear of a market near Sepulveda and Palos Verdes Blvds., only a matter of blocks from the holdup scene.

Three gunmen, each wearing a hood and carrying an automatic pistol, robbed the South Redondo Beach branch of Bank of America

in a daring, mid-day holdup, then fled in a stolen car.

Police said the car was stolen Monday from Roy W. Harper, a Gardena resident. It was turned over to Redondo Beach detectives and agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation for a fingerprint examination.
