# Methodists Seek the Spirit Of John Wesley During 1963

LOS ANGELES—Methodists are looking to 1963 to recover some of the denomination's early vitality, and emphasis on personal witness, discipline, and evangelism.

within." Bishop Kennedy is chairman of a 13-member committee of the Council of Bishops working on observances and special programs in conjunction with the National Council on Evangelism.

In the Southern California-Arizona Conference, 1963 will be Aldersgate Year, a name taken from an event in the life of John Wesley. Wesley's experience changed his life, and the course of the methodist movement.

Historically, Aldersgate was a turning point. Methodism was founded in the late 1720's as a student club at Oxford University.

Now, 225 years later, the church again is calling for deeper, more meaningful experiences in the lives of persons and local churches. Plans to achieve this will differ locally, from church to church. However, the underlying efforts will be the desire to seek a new life in Christ and the church and to communicate it effectively.

It did not throw off any sparks until John Wesley, a don at Oxford's Lincoln College and Church of England clergyman, visited a club meeting on Aldersgate St., London, and felt his heart "strangely warmed."

In his Journal, Wesley wrote, "I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone for salvation. An assurance was given me that he had taken away my sins, and saved me from the law of sin and death."

Many modern Methodists would flunk if asked what happened to John Wesley at Aldersgate, and how Methodism thereafter influenced life in England and America.

Bishop Gerald Kennedy, Los Angeles, predicts "by New Year's Day, 1964, Aldersgate will be in the vocabulary of every church-going Methodist in America. We hope and trust it will become an outward symbol of heart-stirring experience


