

Sabin Vaccination Clinics Open Today, Next Sunday

Sabin vaccination clinics will be set up in the Torrance area at North, South, and Torrance High Schools and will be given today, Sunday, Feb. 3rd, and next Sunday, Feb. 10, from 11 a.m. until 6 p.m.

Those taking the immunization can clip and use the accompanying form, which is a new type of registration blank required for polio immunization with Type III Sabin vaccine.

The U.S. Surgeon General's office recommends that Type III be given to all children because of the potential danger of occurrence of this type of virus.

Because the need for immunization diminishes with advancing age, and because some potential risks of vaccine are believed by some to exist in adults, especially above the age of 30,

vaccination should be used for adults only with the full recognition of its very small risks.

Vaccination is especially recommended for those adults who have a higher risk of naturally contracting the disease.

New DC-8F Jet Trader Delivered by Douglas

Told of VA Pension Benefits

Today, more than two years after the law was passed, Torrance area widows and orphans of World War II and Korean Conflict veterans who were not disabled are apparently unaware they are eligible for pensions under certain conditions, according to Mort Webster, manager of VA's Southern California regional office.

Before July 1, 1960, widows and children of WW II or Korean servicemen were entitled to pensions only if the deceased veteran had a service-connected disability at the time of his death.

Beginning on that date, Congress provided pensions for the widows and orphans of these veterans' widows and orphans. It is no longer necessary for the veteran to have had a service-connected disability.

The pensions range from \$25 to \$60 monthly for widows. For each child, \$15 a month is added, Webster said.

The pension for orphans is \$35 monthly.

This benefit may be payable to a veteran's child or children even though the widow is not entitled to the pension.

The income limit is \$1,800 yearly for widow and \$3,000 annually for a widow with a child or children.

The income limit for orphans is \$1,800 yearly, exclusive of earned income.

Webster said the pension is paid if the deceased veteran was discharged under conditions other than dishonorable and had 90 or more days of service or was discharged sooner for a service-connected disability.

County Votes Against More Judges in '63

The Board of Supervisors has voted to declare a moratorium on additional Municipal and Superior judges for the remainder of this fiscal year.

Supervisor Kenneth Hahn, chairman of the Courts Department on the board, also asked the County officials to oppose Sacramento legislation introduced to authorize additional judges during the current session.

It cost the taxpayers \$100,000 a year to operate each court in Los Angeles County. There are currently 120 judges in the Superior Court and 23 Municipal Districts.

Hahn pointed out that both Judge McIntyre Faries, presiding judge of the Superior Court, and Judge Earl Lippold, presiding judge of the Los Angeles Municipal Court, concurred in his action.

UCLA Offers Lectures on Communism At North High; 2 Choices of Courses

Based on recent lectures which have brought internationally known speakers to UCLA during the past year, a special lecture series and a credit course on "Communism in Theory and Practice" have been planned for residents of the Torrance area.

Six of the lectures planned for general public enrollment are to be held on alternate Thursday evenings starting Feb. 28.

These six are part of a lengthier course which consists of 13 meetings and is designed especially to meet the requirements of teachers. It is a full two-credit course. University Extension fee for the public short course is \$12, while the 13-meeting accredited course, starting Feb. 21 and meeting weekly, is \$35.

With six distinguished speakers scheduled, the lectures are to be held from 8 to 10 p.m. in Room 228 of North High School, 3620 W. 182nd St., Torrance.

"Communism today presents an international challenge to democratic principles and practice. If we are to meet this challenge effectively, it is essential that we understand it. Yet the problem is complex and many-sided, and demands the most sober and meticulous appraisal that sound scholarship can bring it," says Leroy Hardy, associate professor of political science at Long Beach State College, instructor for the course

and moderator for the special series.

Lecturers for the public series as well as the course will include Herbert S. Dinerstein, head of the Soviet section, social sciences department of the Rand Corp.; Harry K. Givertz, professor of philosophy, University of California at Santa Barbara; George G. S. Murphy, assistant professor of economics at UCLA; Robert G. Neumann, professor of political science and director of the Institute of International and Foreign Studies at UCLA; Hans J. Rogger, director of Russian and East European Studies Center at UCLA, and Howard R. Swearer, assistant professor of political science at UCLA.

Persons interested in either of the courses may direct requests to University Extension, UCLA (272-8911, station 3721).

Registrations will be held from 6 to 9 p.m. each evening this week at Orville Wright High School, 5506 W. 80th St., Westchester.

The special three-hour course covers labor history, union management relations, management prerogatives, the development of the Railway Labor Act, Wagner Act, Taft-Hartley Act, and the Landrum-Griffin Act. The course also includes discussion on labor management negotiations and problems.
